19	5. On June 19,	2019, the University of Southern California ("USC"),	
20	through its vendor The Claro Group, provided me with a secure file in Los

was a student at USC (undergraduate or graduate) at any time between 1989 and
2016). The file contained a total of 177,530 unique Pre-Identified and Potential
Class Members based on exact name, address, and USC Identification Number
(the "Notice List"). Of the 177,530 individuals on the Notice List, 13,670 were
Pre-Identified Class Members and 163,860 were Potential Class Members.
6. Prior to mailing notices, JND updated Notice List address
information using data from the National Change of Address (NCOA) database ¹

DIRECT MAIL NOTICE

- 7. Pursuant to the Section 6.1 of the Amended Settlement Agreement, JND mailed a Notice Packet on July 11, 2019 by USPS First Class Mail, postage pre-paid, to the 177,530 Pre-Identified and Potential Class Members identified on the Notice List.
- 8. The Notice Packet for Pre-Identified Class Members contained the Notice of Proposed Class Action ("Long Form Notice") with a Pre-Identified

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and advanced address databases.

¹ The NCOA database is the official United States Postal Service ("USPS") technology product which makes change of address information available to mailers to help reduce undeliverable mail pieces before mail enters the mail stream. This product is an effective tool to update address changes when a person has completed a change of address form with the USPS. The address information is maintained in the database for 48 months.

Claimant ID at the top left of each page of the Long Form Notice that contained an explanation indicating these women were Pre-Identified as Class Members through USC's records and would automatically receive a Tier 1 payment and provided additional Settlement options, and a Tier 2 and 3 Claim Form.

- 9. The Notice Packet for Potential Class Members contained the Long Form Notice without a Pre-Identified Claimant ID and an explanation that they must self-identify as Class Members in order to receive a Tier 1 payment and provided additional Settlement options, a Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form, and a Tier 2 and 3 Claim Form.
- 10. All Notice Packets also contained a colored insert that provided information on how to access the Spanish and Chinese translated Settlement Long Form Notice, Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form, and Tier 2 and 3 Claim Form on the Settlement Website, and a business reply envelope (either domestic or international depending on Notice List recipient's mailing address) for Notice recipients to return claim materials to the Settlement Program postage-prepaid.
- 11. All Notice Packets were mailed in an envelope with call-outs on the front and back of the envelope identifying that the mailing was Court-ordered to encourage Notice List recipients to open and read the Notice Packet contents.

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Representative copies of the Pre-Identified and Potential Class Member Notice Packets are attached hereto as Exhibits B and C, respectively.

12. As of December 12, 2019, 1,520 Pre-Identified and 20,398 Potential Class Member Notice Packets have been returned to JND as undeliverable. JND re-mailed 1 Pre-Identified and 68 Potential Class Member Notice Packets to an updated address provided by the USPS. In addition, JND performed advanced address research for the undeliverables without a USPS updated address, and re-mailed 539 Pre-Identified and 9,238 Potential Class Member Notice Packets to a new or confirmed updated address.

13. As of December 12, 2019, of the 13,670 Pre-Identified Class Members sent Direct Mail Notice, 12,689 or 93% were deemed delivered and 981 or 7% deemed undeliverable. Of the 163,860 Potential Class Members sent Direct Mail Notice, 152,700 or 93% were deemed delivered and 11,160 or 7% were deemed undeliverable.

EMAIL NOTICE

14. Pursuant to the Section 6.1 of the Amended Settlement Agreement, in addition to Direct Mail Notice, JND disseminated on July 11, 2019 by electronic mail the court-approved summarized version of the Settlement Notice

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("Email Notice") to 134,197 Notice List recipients who had valid email address(es) provided in the Notice List data provided by USC. Of the 134,197 individuals on the Notice List with valid email address(es) for Email Notice, 11,836 were Pre-Identified Class Members and 122,361 were Potential Class Members. The Email Notice to Pre-Identified Class Members contained a Pre-Identified Claimant ID and the Email Notice to Potential Settlement Class Members did not contain a Pre-Identified Claimant ID. Representative copies of the Pre-Identified and Potential Class Member Email Notices are attached as Exhibits D and E, respectively.

15. As of December 12, 2019, of the 11,836 Pre-Identified Class Members sent Email Notice, 11,318 or 96% were deemed delivered and 518 or 4% were deemed undeliverable. Of the 122,361 Potential Class Members sent Email Notice, 113,432 or 93% were deemed delivered and 8,929 or 7% were deemed undeliverable.

SUPPLEMENTAL MEDIA EFFORT

16. Pursuant to Paragraph 6.1 of the Amended Settlement Agreement, JND executed a supplemental media effort consisting of a social media (Facebook/Instagram, Twitter, and LinkedIn) and an internet search effort to optimize clicks to the Settlement Website. JND also placed notice in the *Daily*

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Trojan (print and digital) and worked with USC to ensure notice postings in an 2 email blast to the USC Community (faculty, staff, alumni, and students); on USC's website (i.e., USC's home page, Health Center, Commitment to Change, 4 News, and Press Room websites); on USC social networks (LinkedIn, Facebook, and Twitter); in the *Trojan Family*, Alumni Association, Medical Alumni 6 Association, and Law Alumni Association eNewsletters; and at various locations 7 throughout the USC campus. JND also distributed a press release of a shortened 8 9 summary notice ("Press Release") over PR Newswire's US1 Newsline. 10 17. To supplement Direct Mail and Email Notice, starting July 12, 2019 and ending on September 5, 2019, JND implemented a social media effort 12 through three leading social media platforms (Facebook/Instagram, LinkedIn,

Twitter). The social media effort delivered a total of 875,712 impressions to Women 18-54 years of age who on Facebook and Twitter expressed an interest in USC and who on LinkedIn have listed USC as their college in their profile. An emphasis was placed on Women 45-54 years of age to accommodate historic USC Student Health Center records from August 14, 1989 through July 13, 1997. Impressions ran across all devices (i.e., desktop, laptop, tablet, and mobile).

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- 18. The social media campaign included a customized Facebook effort that matched available Class Member email addresses with Facebook accounts and then targeted those matched Facebook accounts with Facebook ads. Of the emails provided, approximately 100,000 matched to a Facebook account and we were able to reach 22,392 of those accounts with Facebook ads during the supplemental campaign period. In total, 534,487 of the digital impressions were served through the customized Facebook effort.
- 19. JND also implemented an internet search effort to further extend notice exposures about the case. When keywords that JND purchased related to the case were searched through Google search engine, a paid ad with a hyperlink to the Settlement Website would appear at times on the search engine results page. These efforts were monitored and optimized so that search ads appeared above or below organic search results for keywords generating the most click-throughs to the Settlement Website. Top performing keywords included: USC Tyndall Settlement; George Tyndall; Dr. George Tyndall; USC gynecologist; Dr. Tyndall; Dr. Tyndall USC; USC Tyndall USC; ISC Tyndall Lawsuit; George Tyndall USC; Tyndall Settlement; and USC Settlement.
- 20. Attached hereto as Exhibit F are screenshots of the digital notices as they appeared on the social media platforms and through Google's search results.

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- 21. JND placed a half page notice in the August 21, 2019 (i.e., the "Orientation/Move-In" Issue which was distributed over four days), August 27, 2019, August 28, 2019, August 29, 2019, August 30, 2019, September 4, 2019, September 5, 2019, and September 6, 2019 issues of the *Daily Trojan* student newspaper. The *Daily Trojan* also ran a ninth insertion on September 9, 2019 for no additional charge. In addition, JND placed a 300 x 250 banner notice that was rotated on the <u>dailytrojan.com</u> website from August 21, 2019 through September 20, 2019. Attached as hereto Exhibit G are the notices as they appeared in each issue of the *Daily Trojan*, as well as a screenshot of the banner notice as it appeared on <u>dailytrojan.com</u>.
- 22. Pursuant to Paragraph 6.1 of the Amended Settlement Agreement, JND worked with USC's marketing team to implement supplemental media efforts through USC. To commence these efforts, on July 12, 2019, USC sent an email outreach effort to the "USC Community" which included 17,927 staff, 7,876 faculty, 37,901 continuing students, 2,406 summer 2019 students, and 217,512 alumni. Attached hereto as Exhibit H is a copy of the email that was distributed.
- 23. Starting July 12, 2019 and through September 4, 2019, USC posted notice on various USC websites including USC's home page, as well

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as the Health Center, Commitment to Change, News and Press Room websites.

Attached hereto as Exhibit I are screenshots of the notice posting at each of the USC websites.

- 24. From July 19, 2019 through September 4, 2019, Settlement notice was posted on USC's social networks, including LinkedIn, Facebook and Twitter. Attached hereto as Exhibit J are screenshots of the USC social media postings.
- 25. At JND's direction, USC also posted notice in the July 23, 2019 and August 20, 2019 *Trojan Family* eNewsletter; the August 1, 2019 and September 5, 2019 USC Alumni Association eNewsletter, with a delivery of 204,991 and 206,684 respectively; the August 22, 2019 USC Medical Association eNewsletter, which was sent to 2,608 alumni; and the August 22, 2019 USC Law Alumni Association eNewsletter, which was sent to 7,807 alumni and 301 individuals in the Law Leadership Society. Attached hereto as Exhibit K are the notice postings as they appeared in each of the eNewsletters.
- 26. To extend Settlement notice exposure, throughout the media campaign, Settlement notices were posted at various locations throughout the USC campus, including the Alumni House, Architecture Student Service, Art

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& Design, Cinematics Arts, Communication & Journalism, Dance, Dentistry, Dornsife, Education, Engineering, Gerontology, Law Offices, Law Public Areas, Medicine, Pharmacy, Public Policy, Social Work, Village Dining, Parkside Restaurant, EVK, University Village North, University Village McCarthy Honors, University Village McMorrow, University Village Cale and Irani, Sierra Apartments, Troy East, Pardee Tower, Parkside, Cardinal Gardens, Century Apartments, and Fluor Tower buildings/locations. Attached hereto as Exhibit L is a sampling of the on-campus Settlement notice postings.

- 27. On July 12, 2019, JND caused a Press Release to be distributed to approximately 11,000 media outlets, as well as over 900 news contacts in the college media industry. Attached hereto as Exhibit M is a copy of the Press Release. An exact match of the press release was picked up 97 times with a potential audience of over 95 million.
- 28. JND also monitored press coverage about the Settlement beyond that of the Press Release and found there to be *extensive* news coverage in virtually all U.S. markets and 68 different countries worldwide, increasing exposure and reach to Class Members. From December 8, 2018 through November 5, 2019, there were over 10,000 mentions related to the Settlement case matter. Attached hereto as Exhibit N is a copy of the USC Student Health

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articles that appeared.

Center Monitoring Report, a sample of news coverage, as well as a few of the

29. The supplemental media and outreach efforts were extensive, thereby increasing reach well beyond that of the direct notice effort. As of December 12, 2019, 60.7% of the user traffic to the Settlement Website occurred during the notice period. Based on the Pre-Identified and Potential Class Member Direct Mail deliverability of 93%, additional Pre-Identified and Potential Class Member Email Notice deliverability of 96% and 93%, respectively, and the Supplemental Media effort, we estimate that Settlement Notice has reached approximately 95% of the Settlement Class.

SETTLEMENT WEBSITE

On February 12, 2019, JND established a Settlement-specific 30. website ("Settlement Website"), www.USCTyndallSettlement.com, that allows Class Members to learn more about the case and proposed Settlement. The "Home" page provides a summary of the proposed Settlement, key dates, and an overview of legal rights and options. The "Claims Portal" allowed Pre-Identified and Potential Class Members to file a Statement of Settlement Class Membership and Tier 2 and 3 Claim Form and supporting documents through

the November 8, 2019 claims deadline. An "Important Documents" page 1 2 provides downloadable PDF copies of important Court documents as well as the 3 Long Form Settlement Notice, Statement of Settlement Class Membership 4 Form, and Tier 2 and 3 Claim Form. The "FAQs" page provides answers to 5 frequently asked questions which were updated throughout the Notice period in 6 response to questions from Class Members and changing circumstances such as 7 8 the California Legislature's passage of AB 1510 that extends the California civil 9 action statute of limitations for damages in certain circumstances. The 10 Settlement Website also provides a "Check Claim Status" page where those who 11 have filed Settlement claim(s) can login and monitor claim status and upload 12 additional documentation. In addition, there are separate pages providing the 13 Notice Packet materials translated to Spanish and Chinese. There is also a 14 separate "Key Dates" page and "Contact Us" page detailing how JND can be 15 16 reached by email, domestic and international toll-free telephone, as well as mail. 17 31. As of December 12, 2019, there were a total 301,620 total views of 18

31. As of December 12, 2019, there were a total 301,620 total views of the Settlement Website pages and documents and 37,941 unique visitors to the Settlement Website. JND will continue to maintain the Settlement Website throughout the Settlement administration process. A true and correct copy of the Settlement Website as of December 12, 2019 is attached hereto as Exhibit O.

33. To assist Class Members and other individuals in contacting Class Counsel for assistance and questions, JND also maintains an email address, classcounsel@usctyndallsettlement.com, and voicemail, 1-888-663-1718, option 8, for Class Counsel. JND sends these emails and messages to Class Counsel daily for handling. As of December 12, 2019, JND has received 246 voicemails and 125 emails for Class Counsel, which does not include those who contacted Class Counsel by phone and email directly.

TOLL-FREE INFORMATION AND CLAIM ASSISTANCE LINE

34. On July 11, 2019, JND established a Settlement-specific dedicated toll-free Interactive Voice Response ("IVR") number, 1-888.663-1718, for Class

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Members to call for additional information and receive claim assistance. Prior to July 11, 2019, JND's Claim Assistance Center Team received specialized training on the specifics of the Settlement program with special training provided by RAINN (the Rape, Abuse, and Incest National Network) to ensure that Claim Assistance Center agents had the necessary sensitivities to deal with calls from victims of sexual abuse and assault.

- 35. As of December 12, 2019, JND has received 3,890 calls to the IVR and JND's female Claim Assistance Center team has handled 2,774 live calls from Pre-Identified and Potential Class Members or other individuals. JND will continue to maintain the toll-free IVR number and assist the Settlement Class throughout the Settlement administration process.
- 36. JND has received consistently positive feedback in support of the Settlement Program. Specifically, comments received by email state that we "made the process seem way less scary and empowered me to share my experience", that they appreciate the "attention to this sensitive matter", that they are thankful for the "prompt response and support" and that "interactions on the phone and over email with your team have been so compassionate and understanding."

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OBJECTIONS 1 2 37. The Pre-Identified and Potential Direct Mail and Email Settlement 3 Notices informed individuals that anyone who wanted to object to the approval of 4 the Settlement could do so by submitting a written statement to the Court on or 5 6 before October 9, 2019. 7 As of December 12, 2019, no Settlement objections have been filed. 38. 8 **EXCLUSION REQUESTS** 9 10 39. The Pre-Identified and Potential Direct Mail and Email Settlement 11 Notices informed individuals that anyone who wanted to be excluded from the 12 Settlement could do so by submitting a written request for exclusion ("opt-out") 13 to JND, postmarked on or before November 7, 2019. 14 15 Exclusion requests must have been timely submitted and contain the 40. 16 following information to be valid: 17 Full name, address, and telephone number; 18 The following statement: 19 I want to be excluded from In re USC Student Health Center 20 Litigation, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. 41. Pursuant to Section 3.6 of the Amended Settlement Agreement, if an exclusion submission was defective for any of the above requirements, JND sent a letter within 10 days of receiving the defective submission to advise the Class Member (if represented the letter is sent via the Class Member's lawyer who submitted the exclusion) that the exclusion submission was defective and that the defect must be cured. Depending on the date of receipt of the defective exclusion submission, the Class Member was provided the later of (a) the Response Deadline of November 7, 2019 or (b) 20 calendar days from the date of the cure letter, whichever date is later.

42. As of December 16, 2019, JND has received 801 timely and valid exclusions and 7 invalid exclusions. Of the 801 timely and valid exclusions, 537 match to Pre-Identified Class Members on the Notice List, 227 match to Potential Class Members on the Notice List, and 37 are self-identified individuals who cannot be matched to the Notice List based on the information provided in the exclusion request. The deadline to cure has passed on all 7 invalid exclusions. In addition, JND received one untimely exclusion requests that was accepted as timely by the parties and is included in the 801 timely and valid exclusions. Lists

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of the timely and valid and invalid exclusions are attached hereto as Exhibits P and Q, respectively.

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CLAIMS PROCESS

43. The Direct Mail and Email Settlement Notices informed Potential Class Members that a Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form must be submitted to participate in Tier 1, Pre-Identified Class Members were informed that they were already included in Tier 1 and did not need to file a Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form, and Pre-Identified and Potential Class Members were both advised of the option of submitting a Tier 2 and 3 Claim Form, and that all claims must be received through the Settlement Website or postmarked by mail no later than November 8, 2019.

44. Since my initial Notice Program and Settlement Administration Declaration was filed on November 18, 2019, JND has continued its deduplication analysis of timely claims and additional claims were de-duplicated by name and address, USC Identification Number, and other unique data fields to remove duplicate claims filed by individuals through multiple submission methods (e.g., online and by mail). In addition, JND is in the process of its claim validation analysis of Tier 1 claims to confirm that claimants meet Settlement

eligibility requirements. JND expects to complete the majority of its claim validation analysis of Tier 1 claims by January 2020 but has preliminarily flagged and removed 207 claims as erroneously filed.² Below is a de-duplicated estimate of Tier 1, 2, and 3 claims as of December 12, 2019:

45. Of the 4,786 Tier 1 Statement of Settlement Class Membership Forms submitted, 3,645 preliminarily appear to match to the Potential Class Members on the Notice List and 1,141 did not and are self-identified or will need further analysis and/or outreach to confirm Class Membership. In addition, pursuant to Paragraph 6.4(a)(ii) of the Amended Settlement Agreement, Settlement Class Members for the period August 14, 1989 to July 13, 1997 must

Pursuant to Section 6.7 of the Amended Settlement Agreement, JND will provide these late claim submissions to the Special Master, once appointed, for evaluation of whether late claims should be accepted.

49. JND is continuing to receive and process all claims to confirm eligibility and claim deficiencies, perform quality assurance procedures, conduct further de-duplication and claim validation, and solicit feedback from the parties. JND's preliminary de-duplication and claims analysis may change prior to any Settlement payment distribution.

<u>UPDATED PRO RATA ESTIMATE</u>

- 50. In my Declaration in Response to the Court's Order Dated April 18, 2019, dated May 17, 2019, Docket No. 129-2, JND provided *pro rata* estimates of the potential ultimate number of claims and the potential likelihood and quantity of a *pro rata* adjustment to the Tier 2 and Tier 3 awards to assist the Court in evaluating the Settlement.
- 51. Now that the claims period has closed, JND has updated the *pro* rata estimate using the preliminary de-duplicated number of claims. This preliminary analysis is being provided prior to confirming eligibility of all Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form submissions and presumes all

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claim deficiencies to be addressed at a later date, once claims processing is complete, would be cured.

52. Pursuant to the Amended Settlement Agreement, all Pre-Identified Class Members and confirmed Class Members who file a Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form will receive an initial \$2,500 Tier 1 Claim Award payment. A Class Member filing a Tier 2 claim may receive a Tier 2 Claim Award in the range of \$7,500 to \$20,000 (less the \$2,500 previously advanced) and a Class Member filing a Tier 3 claim (who participates in the interview process) may receive a Tier 3 Claim Award in the range of \$7,500 to \$250,000 (again, less the \$2,500 previously advanced).

53. To keep things consistent with our initial estimates provided in my prior Declaration, we used the same approximate median value for payment awards at the Tier 2 and Tier 3 levels. For Tier 2 claims, we assumed an average award from the Panel of \$15,000. For Tier 3 claims, we assumed an average award from the Panel of \$125,000. Extrapolating those numbers into our updated estimate yields the following calculations:

BASIC INFORMATION

1. Why did I get this Notice?

If you are a woman who was seen for treatment by Dr. Tyndall at the USC Student Health Center during the period from August 14, 1989 to June 21, 2016, you have the right to know about a proposed Settlement of a class action lawsuit, and your options, before the Court decides whether to approve the Settlement.

This Notice is to inform you about the lawsuit, the proposed Settlement, and your legal rights. The women who sued are called "Plaintiffs." The doctor and university they sued are called "Defendants."

2. What is this lawsuit about?

Dr. Tyndall was a gynecologist at USC's Student Health Center from August 14, 1989, until June 21, 2016. Plaintiffs allege that Dr. Tyndall committed medical malpractice related to a Women's Health Issue and sexually assaulted, abused, and engaged in harassing and offensive behavior towards his female patients at USC. Plaintiffs further allege that USC supervisors and administrators were repeatedly informed of Dr. Tyndall's misconduct but failed to take the necessary measures to protect his patients. Defendants deny plaintiffs' allegations. The Court has not decided who is right.

3. Why is this a class action?

In a class action, one or more plaintiffs called "Class Representatives" sue on behalf of themselves and other people with similar claims. This group of people is called the "Class" and the people in the class are called "Class Members." One court resolves the issues for all Class Members, except for those who exclude themselves from the Class.

This lawsuit is *In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.). The judge is Stephen V. Wilson of the United States District Court for the Central District of California. **DO NOT – UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES – TELEPHONE THE COURT OR THE COURT CLERK'S OFFICE TO INQUIRE ABOUT THE SETTLEMENT OR THE CLAIMS PROCESS.**

4. Why is there a Settlement?

The Court has not decided in favor of the Plaintiffs or Defendants. Instead, both sides have agreed to a Settlement to avoid the costs and risks of trial and appeals. The Class Representatives and their attorneys think the Settlement is best for the Class.

WHO IS IN THE SETTLEMENT?

5. How do I know if I am part of the Settlement?

The Class for the Settlement has been defined as all women who were seen for treatment by Dr. George M. Tyndall at the University of Southern California Student Health Center during the period from August 14, 1989, to June 21, 2016 (a) for Women's Health Issues, or (b) whose treatment by Dr. George M. Tyndall included an examination by him of her breast or genital areas, or (c) whose treatment included the taking of photographs or videotapes of her unclothed or partially clothed body.

"Women's Health Issues" includes but is not limited to any issue relating to breast, vaginal, urinary tract, bowel, gynecological, or sexual health, including contraception and fertility. A list of eligible Women's Health Issues is available on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com. If you saw Dr. Tyndall for any of the reasons in that list, you are a Class Member.

You have already been pre-identified (via USC's records) as a Class Member, and your Claimant ID Number is on the upper left hand corner of each page of this Notice.

6. What should I do if I am not sure if I am included in the Settlement?

If you are not sure whether you are in the Class, you can ask for free help and more information by calling the Settlement Administrator at 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below) or sending an email to info@USCTyndallSettlement.com.

More details about the Class, its claims, and the Settlement can be found in the Amended Settlement Agreement and other documents available on the Settlement website, www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

BENEFITS OF THE SETTLEMENT — WHAT YOU GET

7. What does the Settlement provide?

Monetary Benefits

Defendants will pay \$215,000,000 to settle the lawsuit. This fund will be used to pay Class Member claims (see the answers to questions 8-10 below) and expenses associated with notifying Class Members and with administering the Settlement, including compensating an impartial, three-member Panel who will decide how much individual Class Members receive. The fund will also be used to pay any Class Representative service award(s) awarded by the Court.

Institutional Changes at USC

In addition to monetary benefits, the Settlement requires USC to implement sweeping institutional reforms designed by experts to ensure that the sort of abuse at issue in this case can never happen again. These changes include implementation of university-wide policies to protect USC students and prevent abuse and sexual violence on campus, including policy and procedure changes at the USC Student Health Center. These policies include:

- Increased scrutiny and monitoring of health center employees, including pre-hiring background checks, credential verification, and annual education and performance reviews;
- Improved health center patient practices, including updated sensitive exam practices and allowing students to select a physician based on gender;
- New methods for collecting information about potential misconduct, including through the solicitation of patient feedback and implementation of plain-language notice for recognizing and reporting sexual harassment and gender-based violence;
- Development of new training programs for all USC students and staff designed to prevent sexual misconduct and sexual assault;
- Appointment of an Independent Women's Health Advocate. This independent (non-USC) individual, to be selected jointly by the parties and approved by the Court, will serve a three-year term. The Advocate will (a) receive complaints of improper sexual or racial conduct reported by any patient, student, and/or personnel at the Student Health Center; (b) confirm that all such complaints are investigated by either the USC's Office of Professionalism and Ethics and/or the Office of Equity and Diversity and/or Title IX Officer; and (c) ensure USC compliance with changes required by the Settlement and to report, as appropriate, any failures of this process to USC's Senior Vice President, Legal Affairs and Professionalism. If the Advocate believes the requirements and goals of the Settlement are not being sufficiently addressed by USC, she can raise those concerns to Class Counsel, the Special Master, and ultimately, the Court, for resolution;
- Appointment of an Independent Consultant, selected and compensated by Class Counsel, and having expertise in university best practices related to prevention and response to sexual assault and misconduct, who will be put on the USC Task Force responsible for conducting a wide-ranging climate survey of USC students as well as existing USC policies and procedures for the disclosure, reporting, and response to sexual violence on campus, and make recommendations of changes to implement in light of the survey results. The report and recommendations of the Task Force will be released publicly to the USC community. If the Independent Consultant believes the requirements and goals of the Settlement are not being sufficiently addressed by USC, she can raise those concerns to Class Counsel, the Special Master, and ultimately, the Court, for resolution.

More details about the changes the Settlement requires of USC and the status those changes are available on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

8. How much will my payment from the Settlement be?

How much you get from the Settlement will depend on whether you file a claim and, if you do, what type of claim you file. The details of the claim structure are as follows:

<u>Tier 1 Payment</u>: Every Settlement Class Member is eligible for a guaranteed minimum Tier 1 payment of \$2,500 ("Tier 1 payment"), subject to a *Pro Rata* Increase, simply by being a Settlement Class Member.

(i) Since you are a Class Member who was pre-identified through USC's existing health center records, you have been pre-identified and assigned a Claimant ID Number and will be mailed a Tier 1 payment representing an initial amount for damages. This Tier 1 payment will be mailed even if you also submit a Tier 2 or Tier 3 Claim Form.

<u>Tier 2 Claim Award</u>: You can also choose to submit an online or written Claim Form describing your experience, the impact to you, and/or the emotional distress and/or bodily injury you suffered. Whether you choose to submit a Tier 2 Claim has no effect on your Tier 1 payment; in other words, you will receive your Tier 1 payment regardless. Each Claim Form will be reviewed by an impartial, three-member Panel. If you submit a Claim Form, you may be asked to answer additional questions in writing. An attorney is available to help you with any questions about the Claim Form, at no cost to you. Settlement Class Members who make Tier 2 claims can call 1-888-663-1718, Option 8 or email ClassCounsel@USCTyndallSettlement.com to schedule an appointment with an attorney.

If the Panel determines that you are eligible for compensation based on your Claim Form, you may be awarded a Tier 2 Claim Award of between \$7,500 and \$20,000 as determined by the Panel. Any Tier 2 Claim Award includes your Tier 1 payment amount. This Tier 2 Claim Award is subject to *Pro Rata* Adjustment up or down as detailed below. If the Panel determines you are not eligible for a Tier 2 Claim Award, you will still keep your Tier 1 payment as a Settlement Class Member.

<u>Tier 3 Claim Award</u>: You can also choose to participate in an interview describing your experience, the impact to you, and/or the emotional distress and/or bodily injury you suffered. Class Members who provide an interview along with a Claim Form will be eligible for a Tier 3 Claim Award of between \$7,500 to \$250,000, subject to *Pro Rata* Adjustment, up or down as detailed below.

In addition to a Claim Form describing your experience, the impact to you, and/or the emotional distress and/or bodily injury you suffered, you will be interviewed by a specialist trained in communicating with survivors with sensitivity and compassion, about your experience and its impact on you. Whether you choose to submit a Tier 3 Claim has no effect on your Tier 1 payment; in other words, you will receive your Tier 1 payment regardless.

Based on all information provided, the Panel will determine whether you are eligible for compensation and may award you a Tier 3 Claim Award between \$7,500 and \$250,000. Any Tier 3 Claim Award includes your Tier 1 payment. The Tier 3 Claim Award is subject to *Pro Rata* Adjustment up or down as detailed below. If the Panel determines that you are not eligible for a Tier 3 Claim Award, you will still keep your initial Tier 1 payment as a Settlement Class Member.

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Pro Rata Adjustments. Under no circumstances will any of the \$215,000,000 Settlement Amount be returned to the Defendants. A *Pro Rata* Adjustment will be used to ensure all of the Settlement Amount (less Administrative Expenses) goes to Class Members.

After the Panel has received and reviewed all Tier 2 and Tier 3 Claims and allocated Claim Award amounts, the *Pro Rata* Adjustment amount will be calculated by the Settlement Administrator by comparing the total sum of all Claim Awards with the total amount remaining in the Settlement Fund. (There will be less than \$215 million in the Fund because Administrative Expenses will have been paid out of the Fund prior to the *pro rata* calculation.)

If the sum of the Claim Awards *is less than* the amount remaining in the Settlement Fund, there will be a *Pro Rata* Increase applied to all Tier 1, Tier 2, and Tier 3 Claim Award amounts, which means those Claim Awards will all be increased by the same percentage. The percentage increase will be enough to make the sum of the Claim Awards equal the amount of money in the Settlement Fund, or to increase the Claim Award amounts by 50%, whichever comes first. Therefore, the maximum amount claimants could receive would be \$3,750 for Tier 1, \$30,000 for Tier 2, and \$375,000 for Tier 3.

If the sum of the Claim Awards *is more than* the amount remaining in the Settlement Fund, there will be a *Pro Rata* Reduction applied to all Tier 2 and Tier 3 Claim Award amounts, which means those Claim Awards will all be decreased by the same percentage. (There will be no decrease of the Tier 1 Claim Awards.) The percentage decrease will be enough to make the sum of the Claim Awards equal the amount of money in the Settlement Fund, or to decrease the Claim Award amounts by 25%, whichever comes first. Therefore, the lowest possible amount a claimant could receive under the Settlement would be \$2,500 for Tier 1 (i.e., no reduction) and \$5,625 for Tier 2 and Tier 3 (i.e., 25% reduction of lowest possible Tier 2 or 3 Claim Award).

The illustration below is provided to demonstrate the calculation of the *pro rata* adjustment. For the purposes of the illustration, it is assumed that 15,000 Class Members will be eligible to receive the \$2,500 Tier 1 payment. Of those 15,000, it is assumed that 4,000 Class Members or approximately 25% will file either a Tier 2 or a Tier 3 claim; 3,000 of those will file Tier 2 claims and receive an average award of \$15,000 and 1,000 will file Tier 3 claims and receive an average award of \$125,000. These assumptions result in the following calculations:

Initial Calculation to Determine Total Aggregate Award Amount:

15,000 Tier 1 x \$2,500	\$37.5 million
3,000 Tier 2 x \$15,000	\$45 million
1,000 Tier 3 x \$125,000	\$125 million
Less Tier 1 Offset for 4,000 Tier 2 and 3 claimants who already received a \$2,500 Tier 1 payment	(\$10 million)
Total Aggregate Award Amount:	\$197.5 million

Calculation to Determine Pro Rata Adjustment Amount:

Settlement Fund ¹	\$210 million
Aggregate Award Amount	\$197.5 million
Percentage difference	6% Increase

Calculation to Apply *Pro Rata* Adjustment:

15,000 Tier 1 x ($$2,500 + 6\% = $2,650$)	\$39.75 million
3,000 Tier 2 x (\$15,000 + 6% = \$15,900)	\$47.7 million
1,000 Tier 3 x ($$125,000 + 6\% = $132,500$)	\$132.5 million
Less Tier 1 Offset for 4,000 Tier 2 and 3 claimants who already received a \$2,500 Tier 1 payment	(\$10 million)
Total Aggregate Award Amount Plus 6% Pro Rata Increase:	\$209.95 million

If fewer Class Members are eligible to receive the automatic Tier 1 payment, fewer Class Members file Tier 2 or 3 claims, and/or the average Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts are smaller than what is assumed and estimated in the above example, the *Pro Rata* Increase to the Tier 1, 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts would be larger. Conversely, if more Class Members are eligible to receive the automatic Tier 1 payment, more Class Members file Tier 2 or 3 claims, and/or the average Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts are larger than what is assumed and estimated in the above example, then the Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts may receive a *Pro Rata* Reduction.

Liens. The amount of money you will receive also depends on any legally enforceable liens on the Claim Award. The amount paid to resolve any liens for Settlement Class Members will be paid out of such Settlement Class Member's Claim Award.

¹ This represents the Settlement Fund as of the date of the *pro rata* calculation, by which point the Settlement Fund will have been reduced to pay for Administrative Expenses incurred up to that date per Sections 2.2, 2.34, and 2.35 of the Amended Settlement Agreement. Solely for the purposes of this example, we have reduced the Settlement Fund by \$5 million to account for Administrative Expenses.

HOW YOU GET A PAYMENT

9. How can I get payment(s) from the Settlement?

Tier 1 Payments

You were pre-identified through USC's existing health center records and therefore you received this Notice that contains a Claimant ID Number on the upper left-hand corner. You will be sent your Tier 1 payment once the Court grants final approval of the Settlement and certifies the Settlement Class and any appeals are resolved in favor of the Settlement. You need not take any further action at this time regarding your Tier 1 payment. However, you may also choose to submit a Tier 2 or Tier 3 Claim, as discussed below.

Tier 2 and Tier 3 Payments

All Class Members can choose to submit a Tier 2 or Tier 3 Claim. To do so, you must complete and submit a Claim Form and, for Tier 3, participate in an interview. The Claim Form is available on the Settlement website, www.USCTyndallSettlement.com, and you may also request a Claim Form by email at info@USCTyndallSettlement.com or by phone 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below). Claim Forms can be completed and submitted to the Settlement Administrator online through the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com or mailed to the Settlement Administrator at the address provided above. You also can schedule your Tier 3 interview on the website or by calling the phone number above.

All claims and submissions in the Settlement will be kept strictly confidential by the Settlement Administrator and Panel. Settlement Class Counsel will seek an order from the Court, called a Qualified Protective Order that will authorize disclosure of information under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") for purposes of identifying and resolving any potential medical liens that may be asserted against Settlement Class Members' Claim Awards. Certain information also is required to be provided to Defendants' insurers, and the insurers will keep the information strictly confidential.

For your claim to be valid and timely, your Claim Form must be received by the Settlement Administrator through the Settlement website (www.USCTyndallSettlement.com) or postmarked by mail no later than November 8, 2019.

10. When will I get my payment(s) from the Settlement?

Once the Court grants final approval of the Settlement and certifies the Settlement Class and any appeals are resolved in favor of the Settlement, you will be sent your Tier 1 payment. If a *Pro Rata* Increase is applied, supplemental Tier 1 payments reflecting the *Pro Rata* Increase will go out after all Tier 2 and 3 claims are determined as indicated below.

Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award payments will not go out until all Tier 2 and Tier 3 claims have been received and reviewed by the Panel and Claim Award amounts allocated by the Panel, and the *Pro Rata* Adjustment amount calculated and applied by the Settlement Administrator.

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Timing updates will be provided on the Settlement website, www.uscTyndallSettlement.com and can also be obtained by contacting the Settlement Administrator by email at info@uscTyndallSettlement.com or by phone toll-free at 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below). Please do not contact the Court directly.

11. What am I giving up to get payment(s) and stay in the Settlement?

In exchange for receiving payment and benefits from the Settlement, you give up your right to sue the Defendants on your own for the claims described in the Amended Settlement Agreement. You will also be bound by any decisions by the Court relating to the Settlement. If you do not wish to give up your right to sue the Defendants, you must exclude yourself from (opt out of) the Settlement.

In return for paying the Settlement Amount and providing certain non-monetary benefits, the Defendants will be released from claims relating to the conduct alleged in the lawsuit and identified in the Amended Settlement Agreement. The Amended Settlement Agreement describes the released claims in further detail. Please read that agreement carefully since those releases will be binding on you as a Class Member if the Court grants final approval of the Settlement. If you have any questions, you can talk with Class Counsel free of charge or you may talk with your own lawyer (at your own expense). The Amended Settlement Agreement and releases are available on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

EXCLUDING YOURSELF FROM THE SETTLEMENT

If you don't want a payment from the Settlement, and you want to keep the right to sue or continue to sue the Defendants, then you must take action to exclude yourself from the Settlement Class. This is called "opting out" of the Settlement Class.

12. How do I opt out of the Settlement?

To exclude yourself from the Settlement, you must send a letter to the Settlement Administrator stating that you wish to be excluded from *In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.). Your written exclusion request must include the following:

- Your full name, address, and telephone number;
- The following statement:
 I want to be excluded from *In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.), and understand that by excluding myself, I will not be able to get any money or benefits from the Settlement.
- Your signature.

13. If I don't exclude myself, can I sue the Defendants for the same thing later?

No. Unless you exclude yourself from the Settlement, you give up any right to sue the Defendants for the claims being released in this Litigation (*In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.), and *Jane Doe 1 v. University of Southern California et al.*, No. BC713383 (Cal. Super. Ct., L.A. County)).

If you have a pending lawsuit against any of the Defendants, speak to your lawyer as soon as possible; you may need to exclude yourself from this Settlement to continue your own lawsuit.

14. If I exclude myself, can I get money from the Settlement?

No. If you exclude yourself from the Settlement, you will not receive payment(s) from the Settlement, but you will keep your legal right to sue the Defendants on your own.

16. How will the lawyers be paid?

After the Settlement has been approved, Class Counsel will ask the Court for payment of attorneys' fees and incurred expenses up to \$25 million to compensate them for their services in this Litigation. Any payment to the attorneys will be subject to Court approval, and the Court may award less than the amount requested. Any attorneys' fees and expenses that the Court approves will not come out of the Settlement Amount but will be paid separately by the Defendants.

When Class Counsel's motion for attorneys' fees and expenses is filed, it will be posted on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com. Class Counsel expect to file their motion within 2 weeks after the final fairness hearing currently set for January 6, 2020. Please check the Settlement website regularly after the final fairness hearing if you wish to review Class Counsel's motion for attorneys' fees and expenses. You will have an opportunity to comment on this fee request. The deadline to object to Class Counsel's request for attorneys' fees and expenses will be 30 days after it is filed with the Court and posted to the Settlement website.

If you are represented by a lawyer other than Class Counsel, you are responsible for paying that lawyer's fees and/or costs.

OBJECTING TO THE SETTLEMENT

17. How do I tell the Court that I don't like the Settlement?

If you are a Settlement Class Member and you have objections to any aspect of the Settlement, you may express your views to the Court. You can object to the Settlement only if you do not exclude yourself from the Settlement Class.

You can ask the Court to deny approval by filing an objection. You can't ask the Court to order a larger settlement—the Court can only approve or deny the Settlement the parties have reached. If the Court denies approval of the Settlement, no payments from the Settlement Fund will be made and the Litigation will continue. If that is what you want to happen, you must object.

If you wish to object to the Settlement, you must do so in writing. You may also appear at the final fairness hearing, either in person or through your own attorney. If you appear through your own attorney, you are responsible for paying that attorney. All written objections and supporting papers must: (a) list your name, address, and telephone number; (b) clearly identify the master case name and number (*In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.)); (c) state whether the objection applies only to the objector, to a specific subset of the Class, or to the entire Class, and state with specificity the grounds for the objection; (d) state whether the Settlement Class Member intends to personally appear and/or testify at the final fairness hearing; (e) include the name and contact information of any and all attorneys representing, advising, or assisting the Settlement Class Member, including any counsel who may seek compensation for any reason related to the Settlement Class Member's objection or comment; (f) state whether any attorney will appear on the Settlement Class Member's behalf at the final fairness hearing, and if so, the identity of that attorney; (g) be submitted to the Court either by mailing to the Clerk, United States District Court for the Central District of California, First Street Courthouse, 350

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W. 1st Street, Suite 4311, Los Angeles, CA 90012 or by filing them in person at any location of the United States District Court for the Central District of California; and (h) be **filed or postmarked on or before October 9, 2019**.

18. What's the difference between objecting and opting out?

By excluding yourself from the Settlement, you are telling the Court that you do not want to participate in the Settlement. For that reason, you will not be eligible to receive any benefits from the Settlement and you will not be able to object to it, as it will no longer apply to you or bind you.

By objecting to the Settlement, you are telling the Court you want to participate in the Settlement, but that there is something about it you do not like. If you object, you are still eligible to receive payment(s) from the Settlement (although you will not receive any payment until your objection is resolved).

THE COURT'S FAIRNESS HEARING

The Court will hold a fairness hearing to decide whether to approve the Settlement. You may attend the hearing, and you may ask to speak, if you wish to, but you are not required to do so.

19. When and where will the Court decide whether to approve the Settlement?

The Court will hold its final fairness hearing on January 6, 2020 at 1:30 p.m. at the United States District Court, Central District of California, First Street Courthouse, 350 W. 1st Street, Courtroom 10A, 10th Floor, Los Angeles, CA 90012.

The hearing may be moved to a different date or time without additional direct notice to you. You can check the Court's PACER site, https://ecf.cacd.uscourts.gov, or contact the Settlement Administrator at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com or toll-free at 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below), to confirm that the date has not changed.

At the fairness hearing, the Court will consider whether the proposed Settlement is fair, reasonable, and adequate under the rules governing such settlements. If there are objections or comments, the Court will consider them at that time and may listen to people who have asked to speak at the hearing. The Court will decide whether to approve the Settlement at or after the hearing.

20. Do I have to come to the fairness hearing?

No. Class Counsel will answer any questions the Court may have at the fairness hearing, but you may attend at your own expense if you wish to. If you send an objection or comment on the Settlement you do not have to come to the hearing to talk about it. As long as you filed or mailed your written objection on time, the Court will consider it. You may also hire your own lawyer at your own expense to attend the hearing on your behalf, but you are not required to do so.

21. May I speak at the fairness hearing?

If you send an objection or comment on the Settlement, you may be able to speak at the fairness hearing, subject to the Court's discretion. You cannot speak at the fairness hearing if you exclude yourself from the Settlement.

IF YOU DO NOTHING

22. What happens if I do nothing at all?

If you do nothing and the Settlement is finally approved by the Court, you will receive a Tier 1 payment from the Settlement, and you will be bound by the Court's final judgment and the release of claims detailed in the Amended Settlement Agreement.

GETTING MORE INFORMATION

23. How do I get more information?

This Notice summarizes the Settlement and your rights and options. More details are contained in the Amended Settlement Agreement. Women who were seen for treatment by Dr. George Tyndall at USC's Student Health Center may be eligible for benefits from a class action settlement.

- A Settlement has been reached with the University of Southern California and its Board of Trustees (together "USC") and with Dr. George M. Tyndall, M.D. ("Dr. Tyndall") (collectively "Defendants") in a class action lawsuit. Plaintiffs allege in the lawsuit that Dr. Tyndall assaulted, abused, sexually harassed, committed medical malpractice related to a Women's Health Issue against, or otherwise acted inappropriately towards, female patients while he was a gynecologist at the USC Student Health Center and that USC failed to respond appropriately.
- The Settlement provides a \$215,000,000 fund for the benefit of certain women who were seen for treatment by Dr. Tyndall at the USC Student Health Center between August 14, 1989 and June 21, 2016. As part of the Settlement, USC is implementing institutional changes to protect students and prevent future abuse, including policy and procedure changes at the Student Health Center; ensuring that its medical personnel act consistently with the best practice standards recognized by the SCOPE program of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists; appointment of an Independent Women's Health Advocate; and creation of a Task Force—including an independent expert in university best practices related to prevention and response to sexual assault and misconduct—to recommend university-wide changes to prevent sexual violence on campus. A complete description of the changes USC is implementing can be found on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com. While no Settlement can ever undo what happened, it can provide a measure of resolution, as well as provide a punitive and deterrent effect on the Defendants.
- The Defendants deny all charges of wrongdoing and liability.

1. Why did I get this Notice?

If you are a woman who was seen for treatment by Dr. Tyndall at the USC Student Health Center during the period from August 14, 1989 to June 21, 2016, you have the right to know about a proposed Settlement of a class action lawsuit, and your options, before the Court decides whether to approve the Settlement.

This Notice is to inform you about the lawsuit, the proposed Settlement, and your legal rights. The women who sued are called "Plaintiffs." The doctor and university they sued are called "Defendants."

2. What is this lawsuit about?

Dr. Tyndall was a gynecologist at USC's Student Health Center from August 14, 1989, until June 21, 2016. Plaintiffs allege that Dr. Tyndall committed medical malpractice related to a Women's Health Issue and sexually assaulted, abused, and engaged in harassing and offensive behavior towards his female patients at USC. Plaintiffs further allege that USC supervisors and administrators were repeatedly informed of Dr. Tyndall's misconduct but failed to take the necessary measures to protect his patients. Defendants deny plaintiffs' allegations. The Court has not decided who is right.

3. Why is this a class action?

In a class action, one or more plaintiffs called "Class Representatives" sue on behalf of themselves and other people with similar claims. This group of people is called the "Class" and the people in the Class are called "Class Members." One court resolves the issues for all Class Members, except for those who exclude themselves from the Class.

This lawsuit is *In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.). The judge is Stephen V. 4. Why is there a Settlement?

The Court has not decided in favor of the Plaintiffs or Defendants. Instead, both sides have agreed to a Settlement to avoid the costs and risks of trial and appeals. The Class Representatives and their attorneys think the Settlement is best for the Class.

WHO IS IN THE SETTLEMENT?

5. How do I know if I am part of the Settlement?

The Class for the Settlement has been defined as all women who were seen for treatment by Dr. George M. Tyndall at the University of Southern California Student Health Center during the period from August 14, 1989, to June 21, 2016 (a) for Women's Health Issues, or (b) whose treatment by Dr. George M. Tyndall included an examination by him of her breast or genital areas, or (c) whose treatment included the taking of photographs or videotapes of her unclothed or partially clothed body.

"Women's Health Issues" includes but is not limited to any issue relating to breast, vaginal, urinary tract, bowel, gynecological, or sexual health, including contraception and fertility. A list of eligible Women's Health Issues is available on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

If you believe you are a Class Member based on the definition above, and want to participate in the Settlement, you must complete the Statement of Class Membership Form enclosed with this Notice (also available at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com).

6. What should I do if I am not sure if I am included in the Settlement?

If you are not sure whether you are in the Class, you can ask for free help and more information by calling the Settlement Administrator at 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below) or sending an email to info@USCTyndallSettlement.com.

More details about the Class, its claims, and the Settlement can be found in the Amended Settlement Agreement and other documents available on the Settlement website, www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

BENEFITS OF THE SETTLEMENT — WHAT YOU GET

7. What does the Settlement provide?

Monetary Benefits

Defendants will pay \$215,000,000 to settle the lawsuit. This fund will be used to pay Class Member claims (see the answers to questions 8-10 below) and expenses associated with notifying Class Members and with administering the Settlement, including compensating an impartial, three-member Panel who will decide how much individual Class Members receive. The fund will also be used to pay any Class Representative service award(s) awarded by the Court.

Institutional Changes at USC

In addition to monetary benefits, the Settlement requires USC to implement sweeping institutional reforms designed by experts to ensure that the sort of abuse at issue in this case can never happen again. These changes include implementation of university-wide policies to protect USC students and prevent abuse and sexual violence on campus, including policy and procedure changes at the USC Student Health Center. These policies include:

- Increased scrutiny and monitoring of health center employees, including pre-hiring background checks, credential verification, and annual education and performance reviews;
- Improved health center patient practices, including updated sensitive exam practices and allowing students to select a physician based on gender;
- New methods for collecting information about potential misconduct, including through the solicitation of patient feedback and implementation of plain-language notice for recognizing and reporting sexual harassment and gender-based violence;
- Development of new training programs for all USC students and staff designed to prevent sexual misconduct and sexual assault;
- Appointment of an Independent Women's Health Advocate. This independent (non-USC) individual, to be selected jointly by the parties and approved by the Court, will serve a three-year term. The Advocate will (a) receive complaints of improper sexual or racial conduct reported by any patient, student, and/or personnel at the Student Health Center; (b) confirm that all such complaints are investigated by either the USC's Office of Professionalism and Ethics and/or the Office of Equity and Diversity and/or Title IX Officer; and (c) ensure USC compliance with changes required by the Settlement and to report, as appropriate, any failures of this process to USC's Senior Vice President, Legal Affairs and Professionalism. If the Advocate believes the requirements and goals of the Settlement are not being sufficiently addressed by USC, she can raise those concerns to Class Counsel, the Special Master, and ultimately, the Court, for resolution;
- Appointment of an Independent Consultant, selected and compensated by Class Counsel, and having expertise in university best practices related to prevention and response to sexual assault and misconduct, who will be put on the USC Task Force responsible for conducting a wide-ranging climate survey of USC students as well as existing USC policies and procedures for the disclosure, reporting, and response to sexual violence on campus, and make recommendations of changes to implement in light of the survey results. The report and recommendations of the Task Force will be released publicly to the USC community. If the Independent Consultant believes the requirements and goals of the Settlement are not being sufficiently addressed by USC, she can raise those concerns to Class Counsel, the Special Master, and ultimately, the Court, for resolution.

More details about the changes the Settlement requires of USC and the status of those changes are available on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

8. How much will my payment from the Settlement be?

How much you get from the Settlement will depend on whether you file a claim and, if you do, what type of claim you file. The details of the claim structure are as follows:

<u>Tier 1 Payment</u>: Every Settlement Class Member is eligible for a guaranteed minimum Tier 1 payment of \$2,500 ("Tier 1 payment"), subject to a *Pro Rata* Increase, simply by being a Settlement Class Member.

- (i) Each Settlement Class Member who was pre-identified through USC's existing health center records (which cover the period from July 14, 1997, through June 21, 2016) has been pre-identified and assigned a Claimant ID Number and will be mailed a Tier 1 payment representing an initial amount for damages. This Tier 1 payment will be mailed even if you also submit a Tier 2 or Tier 3 Claim Form.
- (ii) Settlement Class Members who were not identified through USC's existing health center records who have completed online or returned by mail a qualifying Statement of Settlement Class Membership will be mailed a Tier 1 payment, representing an initial amount for damages. To qualify, Settlement Class Members must have their student status confirmed by records from USC registrar's office, or, if the Settlement Class Member is not a student, submit credible evidence of class membership. This Tier 1 payment will be mailed even if you also submit a Tier 2 or Tier 3 Claim Form.

<u>Tier 2 Claim Award</u>: Each Settlement Class Member can also choose to submit an online or written Claim Form describing your experience, the impact to you, and/or the emotional distress and/or bodily injury you suffered. Whether you choose to submit a Tier 2 Claim has no effect on your Tier 1 payment; in other words, you will receive your Tier 1 payment regardless. Each Claim Form will be reviewed by an impartial three-member Panel. If you submit a Claim Form, you may be asked to answer additional questions in writing. An attorney is available to help you with any questions about the Claim Form, at no cost to you. Settlement Class Members who make Tier 2 claims can call 1-888-663-1718 and select Option 8 or email ClassCounsel@USCTyndallSettlement.com to schedule an appointment with an attorney.

If the Panel determines that you are eligible for compensation based on your Claim Form, you may be awarded a Tier 2 Claim Award of between \$7,500 and \$20,000 as determined by the Panel. Any Tier 2 Claim Award includes your Tier 1 payment amount. This Tier 2 Claim Award is subject to *Pro Rata* Adjustment up or down as detailed below. If the Panel determines you are not eligible for a Tier 2 Claim Award, you will still keep your Tier 1 payment as a Settlement Class Member.

<u>Tier 3 Claim Award</u>: Each Settlement Class Member can also choose to participate in an interview describing your experience, the impact to you, and/or the emotional distress and/or bodily injury you suffered. Class Members who provide an interview along with a Claim Form will be eligible for a Tier 3 Claim Award of between \$7,500 to \$250,000, subject to *Pro Rata* Adjustment, up or down as detailed below.

In addition to a Claim Form describing your experience, the impact to you, and/or the emotional distress and/or bodily injury you suffered, you will be interviewed by a specialist trained in communicating with survivors with sensitivity and compassion, about your experience and its impact on you. Whether you choose to submit a Tier 3 Claim has no effect on your Tier 1 payment; in other words, you will receive your Tier 1 payment regardless.

Based on all information provided, the Panel will determine whether you are eligible for compensation and may award you a Tier 3 Claim Award between \$7,500 and \$250,000. Any Tier 3 Claim Award includes your Tier 1 payment. The Tier 3 Claim Award is subject to *Pro Rata* Adjustment up or down as detailed below. If the Panel determines that you are not eligible for a Tier 3 Claim Award, you will still keep your Tier 1 payment(s) as a Settlement Class Member.

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Pro Rata Adjustments. Under no circumstances will any of the \$215,000,000 Settlement Amount be returned to the Defendants. *Pro Rata* Adjustments will be used to ensure all of the Settlement Amount (less Administrative Expenses) goes to Class Members.

After the Panel has received and reviewed all Tier 2 and Tier 3 Claims and allocated Claim Award amounts, the *Pro Rata* Adjustment amount will be calculated by the Settlement Administrator by comparing the total sum of all Claim Awards with the total amount remaining in the Settlement Fund. (There will be less than \$215 million in the Fund because Administrative Expenses will have been paid out of the Fund prior to the *pro rata* calculation.)

If the sum of the Claim Awards *is less than* the amount remaining in the Settlement Fund, there will be a *Pro Rata* Increase applied to all Tier 1, Tier 2, and Tier 3 Claim Award amounts, which means those Claim Awards will all be increased by the same percentage. The percentage increase will be enough to make the sum of the Claim Awards equal the amount of money in the Settlement Fund, or to increase the Claim Award amounts by 50%, whichever comes first. Therefore, the maximum amount claimants could receive would be \$3,750 for Tier 1, \$30,000 for Tier 2, and \$375,000 for Tier 3.

If the sum of the Claim Awards *is more than* the amount remaining in the Settlement Fund, there will be a *Pro Rata* Reduction applied to all Tier 2 and Tier 3 Claim Award amounts, which means those Claim Awards will all be decreased by the same percentage. (There will be no decrease of the Tier 1 Claim Awards.) The percentage decrease will be enough to make the sum of the Claim Awards equal the amount of money in the Settlement Fund, or to decrease the Claim Award amounts by 25%, whichever comes first. Therefore, the lowest possible amount a claimant could receive under the Settlement would be \$2,500 for Tier 1 (i.e., no reduction) and \$5,625 for Tier 2 and Tier 3 (i.e., 25% reduction of lowest possible Tier 2 or 3 Claim Award).

The illustration below is provided to demonstrate the calculation of the *Pro Rata* Adjustment. For the purposes of the illustration, it is assumed that 15,000 Class Members will be eligible to receive the \$2,500 Tier 1 payment. Of those 15,000, it is assumed that 4,000 Class Members or approximately 25% will file either a Tier 2 or a Tier 3 claim; 3,000 of those will file Tier 2 claims and receive an average award of \$15,000 and 1,000 will file Tier 3 claims and receive an average award of \$125,000. These assumptions result in the following calculations:

Initial Calculation to Determine Total Aggregate Award Amount:

15,000 Tier 1 x \$2,500	\$37.5 million
3,000 Tier 2 x \$15,000	\$45 million
1,000 Tier 3 x \$125,000	\$125 million
Less Tier 1 Offset for 4,000 Tier 2 and 3 claimants who already received a \$2,500 Tier 1 payment	(\$10 million)
Total Aggregate Award Amount:	\$197.5 million

Calculation to Determine Pro Rata Adjustment Amount:

Settlement Fund ¹	\$210 million
Aggregate Award Amount	\$197.5 million
Percentage Difference	6% Increase

Calculation to Apply *Pro Rata* Adjustment:

15,000 Tier 1 x ($$2,500 + 6\% = $2,650$)	\$39.75 million
3,000 Tier 2 x (\$15,000 + 6% = \$15,900)	\$47.7 million
1,000 Tier 3 x ($$125,000 + 6\% = $132,500$)	\$132.5 million
Less Tier 1 Offset for 4,000 Tier 2 and 3 claimants who already received a \$2,500 Tier 1 payment	(\$10 million)
Total Aggregate Award Amount Plus 6% Pro Rata Increase:	\$209.95 million

If fewer Class Members are eligible to receive the automatic Tier 1 payment, fewer Class Members file Tier 2 or 3 claims, and/or the average Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts are smaller than what is assumed and estimated in the above example, the *Pro Rata* Increase to the Tier 1, 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts would be larger. Conversely, if more Class Members are eligible to receive the automatic Tier 1 payment, more Class Members file Tier 2 or 3 claims, and/or the average Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts are larger than what is assumed and estimated in the above example, then the Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award amounts may receive a *Pro Rata* Reduction.

Liens. The amount of money you will receive also depends on any legally enforceable liens on the Claim Award. The amount paid to resolve any liens for Settlement Class Members will be paid out of such Settlement Class Member's Claim Award.

HOW YOU GET A PAYMENT

9. How can I get payment(s) from the Settlement?

Tier 1 Payments

To receive a Tier 1 payment you must submit a qualifying Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form. The Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form is available on the Settlement website at

¹ This represents the Settlement Fund as of the date of the *pro rata* calculation, by which point the Settlement Fund will have been reduced to pay for Administrative Expenses incurred up to that date per Sections 2.2, 2.34, and 2.35 of the Amended Settlement Agreement. Solely for the purposes of this example, we have reduced the Settlement Fund by \$5 million to account for Administrative Expenses.

Tier 2 and Tier 3 Payments

All Class Members can choose to submit a Tier 2 or Tier 3 Claim. To do so, you must complete and submit a Claim Form and, for Tier 3, participate in an interview. The Claim Form is available on the Settlement website, www.USCTyndallSettlement.com, and you may also request a Claim Form by email at info@USCTyndallSettlement.com or by phone at 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below). Claim Forms can be completed and submitted to the Settlement Administrator online through the Settlement Website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com or mailed to the Settlement Administrator at the address provided above. You also can schedule your Tier 3 interview on the website or by calling the phone number above.

All claims and submissions in the Settlement will be kept strictly confidential by the Settlement Administrator and Panel. Settlement Class Counsel will seek an order from the Court, called a Qualified Protective Order that will authorize disclosure of information under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") for purposes of identifying and resolving any potential medical liens that may be asserted against Settlement Class Members' Claim Awards. Certain information also is required to be provided to Defendants' insurers, and the insurers will keep the information strictly confidential.

For your claim to be valid and timely, your Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form and/or your Claim Form must be received by the Settlement Administrator through the Settlement website (www.USCTyndallSettlement.com) or postmarked by mail no later than November 8, 2019.

10. When will I get my payment(s) from the Settlement?

Once the Court grants final approval of the Settlement and certifies the Settlement Class and any appeals are resolved in favor of the Settlement, you will be sent your Tier 1 payment if you have demonstrated your eligibility as a Class Member. If a *Pro Rata* Increase is applied, supplemental Tier 1 payments reflecting the *Pro Rata* Increase will go out after all Tier 2 and 3 claims are determined as indicated below.

Tier 2 and 3 Claim Award payments will not go out until all Tier 2 and Tier 3 Claims have been received and reviewed by the Panel and Claim Award amounts allocated by the Panel, and the *Pro Rata* Adjustment amount calculated and applied by the Settlement Administrator.

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Timing updates will be provided on the Settlement website, <u>www.USCTyndallSettlement.com</u> and can also be obtained by contacting the Settlement Administrator by email at info@USCTyndallSettlement.com or by phone toll-free at 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below). Please do not contact the Court directly.

11. What am I giving up to get payment(s) and stay in the Settlement?

In exchange for receiving payment and benefits from the Settlement, you will give up your right to sue the Defendants on your own for the claims described in the Amended Settlement Agreement. You will also be bound by any decisions by the Court relating to the Settlement. If you do not wish to give up your right to sue the Defendants, you must exclude yourself from (opt out of) the Settlement.

In return for paying the Settlement Amount and providing certain non-monetary benefits, the Defendants will be released from claims relating to the conduct alleged in the lawsuit and identified in the Amended Settlement Agreement. The Amended Settlement Agreement describes the released claims in further detail. Please read that agreement carefully since those releases will be binding on you as a Class Member if the Court grants final approval of the Settlement. If you have any questions, you can talk with Class Counsel free of charge or you may talk with your own lawyer (at your own expense). The Amended Settlement Agreement and releases are available on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

EXCLUDING YOURSELF FROM THE SETTLEMENT

If you don't want a payment from the Settlement and you want to keep the right to sue or continue to sue the Defendants, then you must take action to exclude yourself from the Settlement Class. This is called "opting out" of the Settlement Class.

12. How do I opt out of the Settlement?

To exclude yourself from the Settlement, you must send a letter to the Settlement Administrator stating that you wish to be excluded from *In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.). Your written exclusion request must include the following:

- Your full name, address, and telephone number;
- The following statement:

I want to be excluded from *In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.), and understand that by excluding myself, I will not be able to get any money or benefits from the Settlement.

Your signature.

You must mail your written exclusion request, postmarked no later than November 7, 2019 to:

13. If I don't exclude myself, can I sue the Defendants for the same thing later?

No. Unless you exclude yourself from the Settlement, you give up any right to sue the Defendants for the claims being released in this Litigation (*In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.), and *Jane Doe 1 v. University of Southern California et al.*, No. BC713383 (Cal. Super. Ct., L.A. County)).

If you have a pending lawsuit against any of the Defendants, speak to your lawyer as soon as possible; you may need to exclude yourself from this Settlement to continue your own lawsuit.

14. If I exclude myself, can I get money from the Settlement?

No. If you exclude yourself from the Settlement, you will not receive payment(s) from the Settlement, but you will keep your legal right to sue the Defendants on your own.

15. Do I have a lawyer in this case?

If you want to be represented by a lawyer other than Class Counsel, you may hire one at your own expense.

16. How will the lawyers be paid?

After the Settlement has been approved, Class Counsel will ask the Court for payment of attorneys' fees and incurred expenses up to \$25 million to compensate them for their services in this Litigation. Any payment to the attorneys will be subject to Court approval, and the Court may award less than the amount requested. Any attorneys' fees and expenses that the Court approves will not come out of the Settlement Amount but will be paid separately by the Defendants.

When Class Counsel's motion for attorneys' fees and expenses is filed, it will be posted on the Settlement website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com. Class Counsel expect to file their motion within 2 weeks after the final fairness hearing currently set for January 6, 2020. Please check the Settlement website regularly after the final fairness hearing if you wish to review Class Counsel's motion for attorneys' fees and expenses. You will have an opportunity to comment on this fee request. The deadline to object to Class Counsel's request for attorneys' fees and expenses will be 30 days after it is filed with the Court and posted to the Settlement website.

If you are represented by a lawyer other than Class Counsel, you are responsible for paying that lawyer's fees and/or costs.

OBJECTING TO THE SETTLEMENT

17. How do I tell the Court that I don't like the Settlement?

If you are a Settlement Class Member and you have objections to any aspect of the Settlement, you may express your views to the Court. You can object to the Settlement only if you do not exclude yourself from the Settlement Class.

You can ask the Court to deny approval by filing an objection. You can't ask the Court to order a larger settlement—the Court can only approve or deny the Settlement the parties have reached. If the Court denies approval of the Settlement, no payments from the Settlement Fund will be made and the Litigation will continue. If that is what you want to happen, you must object.

If you wish to object to the Settlement, you must do so in writing. You may also appear at the final fairness hearing, either in person or through your own attorney. If you appear through your own attorney, you are responsible for paying that attorney. All written objections and supporting papers must: (a) list your name, address, and telephone number; (b) clearly identify the master case name and number (*In re USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW (C.D. Cal.)); (c) state whether the objection applies only to the objector, to a specific subset of the Class, or to the entire Class, and state with specificity the grounds for the objection; (d) state whether the Settlement Class Member intends to personally appear and/or testify at the final fairness hearing; (e) include the name and contact information of any and all attorneys representing, advising, or assisting the Settlement Class Member, including any counsel who may seek compensation for any reason related to the Settlement Class Member's objection or comment; (f) state whether any attorney will appear on the Settlement Class Member's behalf at the final fairness hearing, and if so, the identity of that attorney; (g) be submitted to the Court either by mailing to the Clerk, United States District Court for the Central District of California, First Street Courthouse, 350 W. 1st Street, Suite 4311, Los

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Angeles, CA 90012 or by filing them in person at any location of the United States District Court for the Central District of California; and (h) be filed or postmarked on or before October 9, 2019.

18. What's the difference between objecting and opting out?

By excluding yourself from the Settlement, you are telling the Court that you do not want to participate in the Settlement. For that reason, you will not be eligible to receive any benefits from the Settlement and you will not be able to object to it, as it will no longer apply to you or bind you.

By objecting to the Settlement, you are telling the Court you want to participate in the Settlement, but that there is something about it you do not like. If you object, you are still eligible to receive payment(s) from the Settlement (although you will not receive any payment until your objection is resolved).

THE COURT'S FAIRNESS HEARING

The Court will hold a fairness hearing to decide whether to approve the Settlement. You may attend the hearing, and you may ask to speak, if you wish to, but you are not required to do so.

19. When and where will the Court decide whether to approve the Settlement?

The Court will hold its final fairness hearing on January 6, 2020 at 1:30 p.m. at the United States District Court, Central District of California, First Street Courthouse, 350 W. 1st Street, Courtroom 10A, 10th Floor, Los Angeles, CA 90012.

The hearing may be moved to a different date or time without additional direct notice to you. You can check the Court's PACER site, https://ecf.cacd.uscourts.gov, or contact the Settlement Administrator at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com or toll-free at 1-888-663-1718 (international numbers provided below) to confirm that the date has not changed.

At the fairness hearing, the Court will consider whether the proposed Settlement is fair, reasonable, and adequate under the rules governing such settlements. If there are objections or comments, the Court will consider them at that time and may listen to people who have asked to speak at the hearing. The Court will decide whether to approve the Settlement at or after the hearing.

20. Do I have to come to the fairness hearing?

No. Class Counsel will answer any questions the Court may have at the fairness hearing, but you may attend at your own expense if you wish to. If you send an objection or comment on the Settlement you do not have to come to the hearing to talk about it. As long as you filed or mailed your written objection on time, the Court will consider it. You may also hire your own lawyer at your own expense to attend the hearing on your behalf, but you are not required to do so.

21. May I speak at the fairness hearing?

If you send an objection or comment on the Settlement, you may be able to speak at the fairness hearing, subject to the Court's discretion. You cannot speak at the fairness hearing if you exclude yourself from the Settlement.

IF YOU DO NOTHING

22. What happens if I do nothing at all?

If you do nothing and the Settlement is finally approved by the Court, you will not receive any payment from the Settlement and, if you are a Class Member, you will give up the right to sue Defendants about the claims in this case as you will be bound by the Court's final judgment and the release of claims detailed in the Amended Settlement Agreement.

GETTING MORE INFORMATION

23. How do I get more information?

A Settlement has been reached in a class action lawsuit pending in the United States District Court for the Central District of California ("Court") titled *In re: USC Student Health Center Litigation*, No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW ("Litigation"). According to existing records, you may be a "Settlement Class Member." The purpose of this Email Notice is to inform you of the Litigation, the Settlement, and your legal rights. What is the Litigation about? Dr. George M. Tyndall ("Dr. Tyndall") was a gynecologist at the University of Southern California Student Health Center from August 14, 1989 to June 21, 2016. The women who sued (the "Plaintiffs") allege that Dr. Tyndall assaulted, abused, sexually harassed, committed medical malpractice related to a Women's Health Issue, or otherwise acted inappropriately towards female patients and that the University of Southern California and Board of Trustees of the University of Southern California (together, "USC") failed to respond appropriately. Dr. Tyndall and USC (collectively "Defendants") deny these allegations. The Court has not decided who is right. The parties have agreed to the Settlement to avoid the costs and risks of a lengthy trial and appeals process.

Who is a Settlement Class Member? The Settlement Class has been defined as all women who were seen for treatment by Dr. George M. Tyndall at the University of Southern California Student Health Center during the period from August 14, 1989 to June 21, 2016 (a) for Women's Health Issues, or (b) whose treatment by Dr. George M. Tyndall included an examination by him of her breast or genital areas, or (c) whose treatment included the taking of photographs or videotapes of her unclothed or partially clothed body. "Women's Health Issues" includes but is not limited to any issue relating to breast, vaginal, urinary tract, bowel, gynecological, or sexual health, including contraception and fertility. A list of Women's Health Issues is available on the Settlement Website at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com.

What are the terms of the Settlement? Defendants will pay two hundred and fifteen million dollars to settle the lawsuit. This fund will be used to pay Class Member claims. 





Folt should make it one of her first actions as president to rename VKC and start addressing other statues and structure names

University's values, like Traveler, USC's mascot white horse that may have been named after Confederate General Robert E. Lee's horse, Traveller.

Von KleinSmid was the University's fifth president,but he also founded a eugenicist organization in Pasadena and wrote a paper advocating for the forced sterilization of people of

It's clear that Von KleinSmid's actions and views have no place in today's society, and therefore his name should have no place on USC's campus.

When Folt removed Silent Sam's pedestal from UNC, the Los Angeles Times reported that, initially, Folt advocated for the statue to become part of a "truly strong interactive [learning] center that tells our full history of this university."

While moving the statue from a place of glorification to a learning space where people could truly understand the history behind the statue could have been a conciliatory move, Folt quickly realized that it was better for UNC's community to remove the monument entirely.

The decision drew criticism from conservative members of the UNC community — in fact, it resulted in UNC's board of governors removing Folt from her position as chancellor months before she had planned on

Folt understood that she would risk her job by removing Silent Sam, yet she still chose to take the strongest possible action. As USC's president, she should act with similar strength in renaming VKC.

President Folt has come to a university rocked by scandals. Students have lost trust in the University administration, and it's Folt's duty to regain that trust by responding to students' demands and needs.

Students have advocated for the University to reconsider VKC's name for years, yet the school has taken little action.

Folt's experience with Silent Sam proves that she is willing to take substantial steps to changing campus structures by changing VKC's name, she can show USC students that she is committed to righting wrongs from USC's history.

USC's lavish spending improves its prestige but ignores student needs.

At the heart of the dichotomy between USC's wealthy and elite status and the frequent feelings of neglect many of its students have endured is a trend that has taken hold throughout the country: the higher education arms race - universities' growing propensity to spend lavishly on superficial sources of appeal like non-academic facilities, campus beautification and famous faculty and lecturers that signal wealth and prestige but have minimal effect on students' educational

> database or compiling and addressing student complaints about certain landlords and housing companies. Local landlords also often fail to uphold their housing contracts because students lack other housing options and don't have the resources to hold their landlords accountable. In an investigation conducted by the Daily Trojan last spring, several students reported that Mosaic Student Communities, one of the largest student housing companies around campus, delayed responding to complaints. One student reported a termite infestation that was left unaddressed for a month. The Delta Kappa Alpha house, which is owned by Mosaic, never had a broken front door lock replaced — a safety concern that persisted for two years. Students have also opened lawsuits against Mosaic for misusing their security deposits for maintenance repairs, which should

One way USC could assist students looking for off-campus housing is by creating a directory list of reputable housing companies and landlords in the area. Students should be able to leave reviews and comments about their experiences, so that future renters have an idea of what to expect. Several universities like the University of Maryland, Boston University and the University of Miami offer databases like this so that their students have an idea of the housing available in the area and know that these companies and landlords are recognized by

the University community. USC could also provide education for first-time renters — whether online on the USC Housing website or in an email to students when they end their on-campus housing contracts. There are many resources online for those who look, but none that are specific to students who live in the University Park area.

While USC may not have the space to provide all of its students guaranteed on-campus housing. does have an obligation to its students who are left to find housing on their own. USC should provide them the education and resources they need to find an affordable, stable and well-kept place to live.

presidency, USC time and again proved its full-throated embrace of the higher education arms race. From 2010 to 2018 alone, USC fully renovated the Lyor Center and the Heritage Hall athletics complex, and it opened the Uytengsu Aquatics Center. The University hired former California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger and former U.S. Army general David Petraeus as faculty members, two men who had no experience in higher education at the time they were hired and have not taught regularly since. USC opened the Tutor Campus Center, which has some academic utility with a few classrooms and lecture halls on the second floor but boasts a campus dining center and a large indoor event space as its primary features. And it finished construction of USC Village, perhaps the University's greatest example of ostentatious spending, complete with retailers, high-end restaurants and a host of other new amenities.

New cafe to replace Nekter

C&G Juice Co. says it will provide similar smoothie options more efficiently.

Nestled between the School of Architecture and the Roski School of Fine Arts lies what used to be the Nekter Juice Bar. Now, it's a USC-owned and operated cafe called C&G Juice Co. where students can enjoy a revamped menu of healthy bowls. The soft opening for the cafe was Aug. 22.

Similar to Nekter, C&G Juice Co. will serve juices, smoothies and açai bowls. According to Garry Marschall, senior associate director of USC Hospitality, the team felt they could create a space that serves healthier and cheaper options on the go.

"We were with Nekter for five years and believed that we could do this ourselves and do it better," Marschall said. "I was approached about this idea before looking at the contract and when it would end ... and then we decided that we should look at when this [new cafe] would be viable for us."

Marschall explained that although the products will be similar, USC Hospitality is working on elevating C&G Juice Co.'s ingredients and efficiency. He said the University used to purchase frozen açai packs from Nekter, which would take longer to blend. The new cafe will instead use products from the açai company Sambazon, which provides semi-frozen açai to make service quicker without compromising the texture or flavor.

"Instead of taking an açai bowl between three to five minutes to make because of all the blending, we are now able to do it in one to two minutes, so the speed of service will be much quicker with basically the same product," Marschall said.

The menu isn't finalized, but Marschall said ingredients in the cafe's three main products range from vegetables like kale and spinach to fruits like pineapples and mangos. To develop their own signature drinks and smoothies, Marschall said the cafe received help from a research and development chef and the previous manager of Nekter.

He also said School of Architecture dean Milton Curry and Roski dean Lynn Kirk played a role in several taste tests, since the cafe will be located in their schools.

The restaurant will also partner with various companies to sell items that aren't available at other food vendors on campus. USC Hospitality is collaborating with local company Positive Foods to provide fresh salads and meal replacements. The cafe will carry vegetarian and vegan options from Café Gratitude, an organic, plant-based food chain. According to Marschall, the cafe will also sell fresh roasted coffee from Intelligentsia Coffee and make its own orange juice.

Naaman Bautista, USC Hospitality's food service assistant manager, said the cafe will also emphasize sustainability by selling glass mason jars that customers can bring back to refill their drinks with a one-dollar discount.

Those who bring their own

Phi Kappa Tau fraternity reestablishes following 30-year hiatus

The fraternity's revival marks the largest Greek organization expansion in five years.

After a 30-year hiatus, Phi Kappa Tau fraternity was officially approved by the University in Spring 2019 to return to Greek Row, marking USC's largest Greek expansion in five years.

After experiencing financial troubles in 1988 that led to its eventual dissolution, students reestablished the fraternity with a focus on anti-hazing policies and strengthening community relationships.

Phi Kappa Tau, which was established as USC's fourth fraternity in 1918, gained 30 members at the end of the 2018-19 school year.

"Our chapter was always in good standing and was never kicked off for hazing or anything like that," Phi Kappa Tau president Seth Novosel said.

According to Phi Kappa Tau Vice President of Alumni Relations Beau Classen, many alumni continued the organization's traditions throughout the chapter's 30-year hiatus. Novosel, a senior majoring in business administration, said the fraternity's Chairman of the Board of Governors Rick Rice hosted weekly tailgates for alumni and was a major player in advocating for the chapter's reestablishment.

"I think they just wanted their fraternity back [and] they just wanted kids to have the same bond they did," said Classen, a senior majoring in communication.

According to Novosel, the University previously restricted Greek life to its 23 fraternities. He said Phi Kappa Tau waited for an opening to reestablish their chapter, which came when several hazing allegations resulted in some fraternities losing recognition on campus in the last five years.

The University officially opened expansion opportunities in 2016, Novosel said. Alongside Rice and other alumni, Phi Kappa Tau's national organization approached USC about restarting their chapter. Darryl Thompson, associate director of organizational growth, said the national chapter met with USC in spring 2016 to consider bringing the chapter back to campus.

The national organization also had to get approval from the Interfraternity Council to reestablish the chapter, IFC President Matteo Mendoza said.

Novosel said IFC and the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Leadership and Development worked together to assess the organization's proposal. Once the proposal was approved last October, the national organization began recruitment for leadership positions within the chapter as part of the reestablishment process.

According to Novosel, the summer-long recruitment process required in-person visits with members of the national organization, speeches outlining their qualifications and phone interviews with higher-ranked staff at the national headquarters in Oxford, Ohio.

"The membership that they were able to achieve in their first semester on campus is nothing short of impressive," Mendoza said. "I think it's a testament to the strength of Greek life that they're already seeing so much success."

Phi Kappa Tau's progress was also recognized at the IFC's awards ceremony. The fraternity was recognized with the Rise of Troy award for its excellence in recruitment.

Additionally, Novosel received the award for Emerging Greek Leader of the Year for his efforts in coordinating the expansion.

Now entering its second operating semester, Phi Kappa Tau is promoting a staunch policy against hazing, since numerous fraternities have lost recognition due to hazing violations in recent years.

"Our founding was predicated upon a similar [anti-hazing] circumstance. [The founding members] saw that as an opportunity to change [hazing culture]" Thompson said of the USC chapter.

Novosel said he is proud of the efforts the IFC is making to move away from a supposed hazing culture.

"I think Matteo has done a fantastic job of really making a change on this culture and I think this year we are really going to notice that change," Novosel said.

USC alumni-produced horror film blends thrills with satire

In the post-"Get Out" era of horror-comedy, it's difficult to see new films without the veil of the movies' shadow. "Ready or Not," a horror comedy produced by USC alumnis Tripp Vinson and James Vanderbilt, is no freer of that burden than any other new horror film. From the moment the camera pulls away from a sinister shot of a devil playing cards to a strictly humorous scene, it is difficult to avoid that connection.

To its credit, the film never feels like a cheap copy of the former but almost like a logical alternative. Here, instead of race relations, the cinematic conversation centers on the rich. Yet, the film never feels preachy, nor does it obsess itself with forcing social commentary.

The movie consistently walks a tightrope between seemingly opposing conventions and ideas. The opening scene is dim and gloomy in typical horror or thriller movie fashion. The scene that immediately ensues, along with the timing and stylistic decisions of the title cards, makes the film feel like it might be a light-hearted comedy, yet the film is neither. At times it favors drama or leans into its gorier elements, but never for long and never free of another thematic or genre dimension.

The movie's ability to introduce social commentary in a way that is immediately visible, but not

especially forced or obsessive, is commendable. It's obvious "Ready or Not" is poking fun at the 1% by positioning the richest characters as the most evil — we see this most directly with the way that Charity Le

Domas is portrayed. The most striking feature of this film is not its ability to catapult us from emotion to opposing emotion or from character allegiance to opposing character allegiance, rather it is the remarkable ability to do both at once — to make the viewer both hate a character and root

for them against all others, to have

laugh and be repulsed by any singu-

Unexpectedly (and even more proficiently than "Get Out"), "Ready or Not" is masterful in its manner of evoking emotional plurality, in the viewer, especially in a way where the joke or gore feels earned

and genuine. When there's a shot of the main character, Grace (Samara Weaving) getting injured, for instance, it never feels like it's for the sake of blood.

The film's weakest moments were mostly with respect to specific characters and performances, mostly early on in the film. Aunt Helene, played by Nicky Guadagni, in particular, feels a bit cartoonish in her villainy. Her introductory shots and much of the performance felt cheap or embellished. Given the surround ing performances and overall sincerity of the film, much of her character felt drawn on. In the beginning, some of Andie MacDowell's boisterous Becky Le Domas performance was also distracting.

Yet the film had many layered and believable performances by its leads. Adam Brody did a wonderful job of showing Daniel Le Domas' internal struggle in a manner that felt rounded and emotionally impactful. Mark O'Brien's character, Alex Le Domas, has a series of devastating and shocking experiences, the toll of which O'Brien demonstrated beautifully. And finally Weaving, who played the protagonist Grace, did a beautiful job of making each additional devastation feel new and

This film felt absurd vet logical. The premise and actions taken by the characters were always surprising, but never lost their sense of in-

"Ready or Not" was delightful to watch. The story feels original and compelling while maintaining a lot of emotional dexterity and control, which is a credit to screenwriters Guy Busick and Ryan Murphy as well as many of the actors. It truly does meet, and in some respects exceed, the "Get Out" benchmark.

■ n the midst of a dinner rush at Grand Central Market, secluded from the main arteries of the food hall gushing with people, I'm sitting perched on a barstool, staring at a wall of bagged tostadas. In front of me is a plate piled high with fresh shrimp ceviche, speckled with crisp cucumber and cilantro. A single bite and the sounds of the market are drowned out with the crunch of tostada. complementing the bright ceviche with the subtle flavors of toasted corn and oil.

La Tostaderia was one of my tourist destination. Vendors like favorite restaurants in Grand Central Market. Despite its high prices, I liked the staff, and the tostadas were — "Hey, have you ever heard of

Yerba Mate?' I stop, mid-chew, to stare up at the bearded 20-something leaning against the bar next to me.

"What?" I ask. Does he not register my headphones? The book in my hand? The fact that I am sitting alone?

"Have you ever heard of Yerba Mate?" "Well, yeah."

"It's way healthier than that stuff." He gestures to the can of Monster Energy beside my plate of ceviche.

"Oh, yeah, energy drinks are kind of a vice of mine."

"Well Yerba Mate's got a lot of caffeine in it, but it's all natural. Tastes good too." "Oh, OK." Who was this guy?

Was he a Yerba Mate salesperson? Why was he telling me what to drink?

"Yeah. I work at Belcampo, I just had to come over and tell "Thanks."

"Would you maybe wanna go out sometime?'

I think the best way to describe Grand Central Market as it currently stands is by the Belcampo Meat Co. employee who tried to shame me into dating

Grand Central Market encapsulates everything good and bad about current restaurant trends in Los Angeles. Most of the food is expertly-crafted, varied and fresh, albeit at a high price point. There's obvious respect for the city's history, but there's also an ambition to break into a new audience and to start new fads. And, in the pursuit of creating something new, Grand Central Market has erased something old

The market is a surviving relic from more than a century ago, weathering the drastic changes Downtown Los Angeles has seen. When it was first established, it catered to the elite higher class living in the city, functioning as a traditional market for those who could afford fresh meat and produce. As the rich left downtown in the coming decades, Grand Central Market became a primarily Latinx shopping center, selling imported produce and spices from Mexico. To this day, Latinx influence permeates throughout the food hall vendors like Tacos a Tumbras, Chiles Secos and Valeria's Chiles and Spices have been around for decades. In the early 2010s, Grand

Central Market underwent a series of transformations, introducing new vendors to revitalize the struggling dining center. Over the next few years, the market became a pioneering food hall and quintessential



Since 1917, the LA Grand Central Market has housed hundreds of food vendors, but as new ones set up shop, established vendors are slowly being driven out.

Eggslut and Sari Store have garnered critical acclaim, while restaurants like the vegan Ramen Hood or nostalgia-centered PBJ. LA have tapped into new markets within the city. The entire market smells of a hundred different

things at once — grilling meat, cooking garlic, waffle cones, fresh masa. The narrow hallways between stalls are constantly filled with eager-eved visitors overwhelmed by neon signs and the sheer spectacle of it all. While the owners of Grand

Central Market claim that the new business draws in all types of people, it is clear that these new customers are mostly white, welloff or tourists. Legacy vendors are overlooked in light of newer, more popular stalls, and the sweeping hand of gentrification across

of their regulars. The historical Grand Central Market is quickly

being forgotten. In a way, Grand Central Market serves as a microscopic view of the changing landscape across East and Downtown Los Angeles, as richer, whiter populations push out Latinx communities and attract new businesses. It demonstrates the excellent culinary progress this city has made but also showcases the ugliness such an expansion brings with it.

Ironically, Grand Central Market has completed a full circle, catering to the rich yet again. And despite the undoubted impact it has made on L.A.'s food culture in recent years, I can't help but feel torn eating there.

Also, who the hell thinks that insulting someone's taste is going to make them want to date you? I gave him my number but never texted him back.

football outside, catch around, they were always a step faster than me because they were older.'

The eldest of the three St. Brown children, Equanimeous, is a wide receiver for the Green Bay Packers. The middle child, Osiris, is a senior wideout at Stanford.

Most children placed in Amon-Ra's position would feel the weight of inevitably enormous expectations. Not this one, though — that sort of thing just doesn't affect St. Brown.

"I never feel pressure for anything," he said. "The only pressure you have is the pressure you put on yourself."

It's not pressure but competition that makes St. Brown go. Sophomore quarterback JT Daniels has known and played with St. Brown since they were both in seventh grade, and while Trojan fans are just getting familiar with the high achieving wideout, it's nothing new for USC's signal-caller.

"He's competitive in everything he does," Daniels said, recalling a time when St. Brown nearly broke a controller after his long-time quarterback beat him in FIFA. "No matter if it's fashion, Madden, [NBA] 2K everything.

Competition is inherent with St. Brown; he lives off it, feeds off it, moves because of it. Competing against his brothers played a big role in developing that mindset, but one doesn't have to look outside his family to find another driving source of his competi-

Amon-Ra, Osiris and Equanimeous are the sons of one of the most successful bodybuilders of the 1980s: three-time Mr. World and two-time Mr. Universe John Brown.

Naturally, Brown had each of his three sons hitting the gym around the time most kids were getting acclimated to second grade.

"I think I was seven years old when I started lifting," St. Brown said. "Lifting was innate in us because he pushed that in us really early on. So I think we really got the edge on other kids growing up, being stronger than them, because obviously our dad was a weightlifter. He pushed us in the weight room, so just being stronger than the kid in front of us really helped us growing up."

Is that around the time St. Brown began to dominate on the gridiron? After all, bench pressing 135 pounds at age 8 would figure to separate him from kids who likely first saw the inside of a gym around 12.

His quarterback isn't so sure. He thinks St. Brown's been on a different level for quite a bit longer.

"Probably since birth," Daniels said. "He's always been Amon."

John Brown is a tough father who wants nothing but the best for his three similarly-aged kids who all play the same sport at a high level. There are comparisons to be drawn between the St. Browns and the infamous Ball family, but the youngest receiver doesn't see it that way.

"When we're all on the football field or in the weight room, when he's training us, he's our coach, he's really tough," St. Brown said. "But then outside of that he's a really loving father, and he's going to be just a normal father, have fun with us, joke around ... [people] kind of see us in that same way, but I think we're two kind of different families."

St. Brown's father has been training his children in the weight room and guiding their diet for years, and Daniels has seen the effects of Brown's influence first hand.

"He wasn't even tired after the first [fall] practice," Daniels said. "He ran four and a half miles. That's like, sprinting. Two and a half hours, he ran four and a half miles, and it was like nothing for him."

St. Brown's physical fitness has helped him become one of the Pac-12's best receivers after just one year at the collegiate level. A five-star product out of Anaheim, St. Brown led the Trojans with 60 receptions in 2018, piling up 750 yards and three touchdowns on the season.

He's doing everything he can to bring USC back to the top of the college football stratosphere. St. Brown came to USC with the intention of winning games and picking up a few Heismans along the way, so don't expect him to take any prisoners this year. After all, this is Amon-Ra St. Brown — whose father added "St." to his kids' last names and named his youngest after one of the most impor-

The trilingual sophomore, just as fluent in German and French as he is in dominating on Saturdays, is carving his own path and doesn't plan on stopping anytime soon. Equanimeous and Osiris motivate him to be better, but Amon-Ra's plans are far greater than surpassing those two.

tant Egyptian gods. He is destined for

If you ever run into St. Brown around campus, ask him who holds the throne between him and his brothers. He'll give you the same answer that any youngest child would give but few would actually believe:

"You're looking at him right now." You might be skeptical at first, but

the look in his eyes as he delivers those six words should tell you all you need

St. Brown doesn't just believe it. He knows it. And he's ready to prove it.

LA Times editor speaks at USC

Norman Pearlstine discussed the role of social media in the journalism industry.

Los Angeles Times Executive Editor Norman Pearlstine spoke at the Sheindlin Forum in Wallis Annenberg Hall Tuesday, discussing the importance of unbiased media coverage and the future of the changing journalism industry.

Annenberg Dean Willow Bay introduced Pearlstine, who was joined by Professor Geoffrey Cowan and School of Journalism Director Gordon Stables.

"I view [the *Times* as] a window to the future," said Pearlstine, who was hired as executive editor of the *Times* in June 2018. "I think that it's one of those things that the stories come from anywhere and you try to empower people to go with the things that they think are important."

Pearlstine spoke about the decline of print and how technology and social media have presented new challenges for news consumption.

"We get the bulk of our revenue from print, and you start every January saying that if you're lucky, the decline will be no more than 10%, but with the recognition that the decline of print revenue will be more than that," Pearlstine said.

Stables asked Pearlstine about the role technology has played in transforming news distribution, specifically the role of podcasts in today's media.

"I think it's still early days for podcasts," Pearlstine said. "It's not clear to me what the model is long-term, but I think when you live in a part of the world where traffic defines your life, podcasts resonate."

While Pearlstine said the news industry faces relentless pressure from digitalization, finances aren't his only concern.

"One of the reasons our country is so divided is I can spend all day communicating with people who have the same opinion as me," Pearlstine said. "How do you maintain the integrity of your content in a world where most of the people who see your content have an intermediary, be it Facebook, Google, Twitter or Apple News, where everything they're trying to do is to homogenize the feed where you don't differentiate what we're trying to do from what lots of other people are trying to do?"

When discussing the challenges of leading a newsroom, Pearlstine said it all starts with understanding community and identity.

"We begin by saying, 'What does the brand of the *L.A. Times* give us license to do? What does the collective intelligence of the people enable us to do without the brand?"

Pearlstine expressed concern toward the reliance on social media as a news source and urged caution when balancing revenue and honest media coverage.

"The brilliance of the ways that technology has changed information for the first time, choice really resides with the reader," Pearlstein said. "At the same time if we're doing our job, we will insight you with the things you

Spoiler Alert wants you to have fun

at its shows. However, there will always be people having more fun than you the performers themselves. Remember when you thought that

winging that speech for your communication class would be easy? You know how that turned out. Imagine being in a group whose goal it was to wing, well, *everything.* Enter Spoiler Alert, an improv group founded in 2011 whose goal is to spread joy at USC.

Spoiler Alert performs a signature long-form/short-form hybrid style of improv, which comes in two forms: the episode, in which the group improvises a 45-minute episode of a fictional TV show created from audience suggestions of genre and title, with "commercial breaks" consisting of improv games, and a mono-scene, which is one 30-minute scene that takes place in the same room with the same characters.

The goal in each of these approaches to long-form improv is not to be the funniest person in the room. Rather, it's to share truths that the audience can relate to.

"There's this philosophical idea in comedy and in improv specifically that the funniest thing you can ever do in any moment is tell the truth," Liam Clancy, the president of Spoiler Alert, said. "The audience likes to see their lives validated in some sense because they want to know that they're not alone, and by showing that relationships can be weird and complicated. That's funny enough. You don't have to

Potential new members enter auditions, which consist of a group of four to five auditioners playing an assigned improv game while the group watches, according to Clancy, a junior majoring in economics and neuroscience. They "steamroll," a term in improv that means making the scene all about themselves. During last season's auditions, the auditioners that remained silent but handled the steamrolling

situation in a mature fashion were the

ones that stood out to Clancy and were among the ones offered callbacks.

"The other thing we really look for in auditions are people who are different than our troupe now," Clancy said. "Everyone in our troupe is very different, from a very different background, has very different hobbies, and that's part of what makes us good. You can only improvise on stuff that you know, so we all like to have a very broad knowledge base."

Spoiler Alert rehearses twice a week for two hours at a time. This is the only shared trait among their rehearsals.

"We're always trying to vary it up, do something different, practice a different muscle, practice a different

Note No. 2: If you're feeling a bit fancy, such as with a burger or hot dog topped with caramelized onions and blue cheese, an overly fruity wine will help add balance. A Radius Cabernet (\$11) from Columbia Valley, WA, is the perfect match. This delicious Cabernet will remind you of the homemade jams your grandmother made for you with its aroma of red fruits and black cherries. It's a sure crowd-pleaser with a surprising finish, so be sure to bring an extra bottle to share with friends.

Note No. 3: Wine-drunk is preferred if you're planning on actually watching the game. The term "beer belly" exists for a reason — beer can make you bloated. If you're like me, and going to the game means taking hundreds of photos for Instagram, then you definitely don't want to look bloated in your gameday outfit. Maybe a bit of wine could assist you in making small talk so it seems like you actually understand the game, because I sure don't.

Note No. 4: This is perhaps the most important note. Wine is for every occasion. It's never too pretentious or snobby to drink wine, even if it's at a tailgate. For so long, wine has been unapproachable for most people, with names that most people cannot pronounce and the financial costs associated with it. But don't let these factors stop you from enjoying wine.

You don't need to know how to pronounce it properly since it's very likely most people around you won't know either, and those who do are probably too drunk to care. skill," said Cameron Bennett, a Spoiler Alert member majoring in economics.

Sometimes, the group does compassion meditation sessions during which each person brings up a question about improv and a prompt about their day, and each person responds to what the others have posed. It allows the members of Spoiler Alert to enter the headspace necessary to begin improvising and to release some of the baggage of their day.

What began as an extracurricular for the members of Spoiler Alert has slowly influenced their daily lives. For instance, an improv rule from the Upright Citizen's Brigade — an improv and sketch comedy group founded in 1990 — of noticing the first unusual thing in a scene has allowed Clancy to become more attentive to the interesting and humorous occurrences constantly around him.

Bennett believes that improv has allowed him to foster the skill of truly listening to the people around him.

"There's this other concept in improv ... 'yes, and' ... at the core of it, it means, the only way you can continue

to develop your scene and add onto it and improvise is if you're 100% listening to what the other person is saying and accepting that as the truth of that scene and then adding onto it," Bennett said. "Like never saying no to what someone else is bringing to the table, always taking that idea, and that's incredibly useful just in life."

While growing up, Spoiler Alert member Ruby Marker felt that her comedy was perceived as irritating by others due to her gender. However, being a member of Spoiler Alert has given her a community that appreciates her contributions.

She explained that most people often misunderstand that the taking of natural resources does not always correlate with just environmental destruction — for Alaska, its directly linked to the state's economy.

state's economy.

Treadwell's interest in art sparked when she dropped her Spanish major and decided to take a painting class at the University of Notre Dame. She eventually got invited to become one of the 12 Young Explorers on the Heart of the Arctic cruise. Already in love with her homeland, this trip furthered her interest in the North, its culture and the resources it provides for the rest of the planet.

Now a senior at USC majoring in art and geographic information science and technology, Treadwell shares these intertwined passions with a greater audience.

"The reality is that we use these resources, [like oil], every single day all around the world, and it's one of our main sources of economy in Alaska," Treadwell said. "We have an incredible amount of land up there that's not developed, but there are some pretty great places to get natural resources."

According to the Alaska Permanent Fund, Alaskans get repaid through tax returns for the resources taken from their state, which, Treadwell said, debunks the misconception that energy development is only beneficial for one specific corporation. Instead, the taking of Alaskan materials is advantageous for both Alaskans, the companies that produce the materials from nature and the rest of the world.

With her art, Treadwell informs her audience of the positive acts natural resource development create for the environment that are often ignored.

"I was really trying to make work that maybe in some ways glorifies [natural resource development], but also just shows it as it is," Treadwell said. "Whoever comes and looks at it can make a decision about it based on how they feel."

popularly elected by them," Stone said in a previous Daily Trojan article. "And that applies when it comes to staff and faculty, they're all elected and can hopefully adequately represent their constituents."

Stone said there have been a number of scandals in the past within USG and USC that have distracted from the mission of the undergraduate experience and thrown USC into national scrutiny

But Tahsin said issues like the college admissions scandal - which was revealed in an FBI investigation in March right before the start of her and Stone's term — drive her and other students to create change at USC.

In light of these incidents, she said USC has been working to "break out of the silos that exist to push forward a more united value system." Stone said there has been an upward swing in administrative accountability and a drastic increase in the inclusion of students — both from USG and from other groups — on committees, task forces and in the general conversa-

Stone and Tahsin have also worked

throughout the summer to plan their agenda for the new school year.

Stone and Tahsin worked with the Office of Student Affairs to reduce the amount of fees student organizations pay for facilities when they host events. The partnership helped them set aside \$15,000 in waiver fees for or ganizations to draw from throughout the school year.

USG also launched diversity and sustainability training Aug. 30 that requires recognized student organizations to send five representatives to participate in these trainings and take exams to show what they learned. USG also hopes to make a system where branches of USG can collaborate to form task forces in order to address various campus issues.

"It might be something like an incident of sexual assault or a scandal, but it could also be a long term advocacy project like expanding Lyft hours," Stone said. He said that they are working on pairing these student task forces with administrative ones, so they can work hand in hand on tackling these campus issues.

Stone and Tahsin are also focused on improving wellness initiatives across campus. One of these efforts include working with the Campus Wellbeing and Education Office to implement Ask Ari, a virtual wellness assistant platform that answers questions for students, faculty and staff.

Other efforts to improve student life include increasing direct funding to registered student organizations, expanding free Lyft hours depending on what time the sun sets and improving the Trojan food pantry, which will move from Parkside Apartments to a space next Cafe 84.

"It's going to have a big industrial kitchen," Stone said. "It will also have a Director of Student Wellbeing who will be able to help students register for things like CalFresh and connect to different resources in the commu-

Truman Fritz, USG senior director of communications, said he aims to improve accountability and transparency in USG to encourage more students to express what improvements they would like to see.

"We really want to emphasize that USG [is] here for you, we are your student government, we represent you, all 20.000 students," Fritz said.

Fritz and the rest of USG believe in the importance of fostering an environment in which students have a source to go to with their problems, where every student's voice is heard.

After a successful pilot of a multistream waste system, Sustainability Director Isabella Caltabiano said her department will first implement the system in freshman residential colleges. She hopes to eventually install the multi-stream recycling, waste and compost bins in all residential colleges.

"On top of that, I'm looking to colways that we can make USC more sustainable on a greater scale. This will be the first time we have the administration really backing us and propelling us forward," she said, referring to Folt's background as an environmental scientist.

With new administrators including Folt, Zukoski and Vice President for Student Affairs Winston Crisp, Stone and Tahsin said they hope to see USC transform its value system to help students, faculty and staff feel more included and informed, and that the culture of the University begins to shift.

"Everytime we come back, we have big events, we go to the football game, we feel proud to be Trojans — but there have definitely been issues over the last couple of years that have eaten away at the pride for a lot of peo-

ple," Stone said. Ultimately, Stone believes that there are a lot of the right people in the right positions forming good relationships that together can help bring that pride back for everyone.

Lavender Lounge, LGBT Resource Center to downsize

The center will move to a new space in the Student Union next to the cultural centers.

The LGBT Resource Center and Lavender Lounge will move its offices to the fourth floor of the Student Union later this semester, LGBT Resource Center Director Kelby Accardi-Harrison confirmed Aug. 30.

According to Accardi-Harrison, the move, which does not have a finalized date, is the result of years of administrative decisions that led to student protests and organizational complaints regarding size of the office space.

According to Monique Allard, who served as interim vice president of student affairs until Winston Crisp assumed the position Aug. 16, the Resource Center will lose approximately 27 sq. ft. in its new office space on the fourth floor. According to Allard, the relocation will situate the Resource Center and Lounge alongside the Center for Black Cultural Student Affairs, the Latinx Chicanx Center for Advocacy and Student Affairs and Asian and Pacific American Student Services.

"All of the cultural and resource centers, otherwise known as the Student Equity and Inclusion areas, have been working toward providing more intercultural and intersectional programming to support students' multiple identi-

According to Accardi-Harrison, tion with the Resource Center.

"I do think it's meeting a need by creating a better, more hopeful space in the sense of intersectional identity," Accardi-Harrison said. "I honestly feel the administration feels the same way. Ideally there would be more square footage"

USG President, VP focus on transparency, campus wellness

USG leaders hope to improve wellness, sustainability and communication on campus.

Trenton Stone and Mahin Tahsin take on this year of change as the Undergraduate Student Government president and vice president, respectively. Though the student leaders took office in April, they have set an agenda of ambitious goals for the year, which includes improving student wellness, stressing Universitywide sustainability and increasing dialogue with University administra-

They have led the University since the end of the last academic year, after campaigning as a write-in ticket on promises of student representation, increased administrative accountability, improved student resources, a reconfigured health and safety system and an open campus climate.

When Stone and Tahsin first joined USG in 2017, neither of them expected to run for an elected position — let alone for president and vice president. Stone proposed the idea of joining the election as write-in candidates last January after only one ballot, former USG Senators Michaela Murphy and Meagan Lane, entered the race by the initial deadline. He partnered with Tahsin, and the two hoped to provide another option for students come the election.

"We really wanted to be the best that we could for the student body

and perspective, more so than we've seen in the past," Stone said.

Stone, a junior studying international relations and philosophy, and Tahsin, a senior studying business administration and economics, have previous experience working together within USG's funding branch. Tahsin served as the director of the professional and academic fund,

where Stone applied to be a delegate in September 2017. Stone was also a senate aide in the legislative branch at the time.

"It was so cool to see the amount of resources and the amount of people that were engaged with student government," Stone said. "We have almost 500 people that will touch our organization in some way this year, and to see all of them so passionate

about a similar mission was so impactful to me."

One year after her starting with USG, Tahsin was brought on to serve as the director of the discretionary fund, and Stone took on her previous position heading the professional and academic fund to provide funding for events programmed by student-run, undergraduate organizations.

This Friday, the Thornton School of Music will host its first concert of the semester with the Thornton Symphony performing Shostakovich's 10th Symphony. In anticipation, this week we will be highlighting a different faculty member, student or program, spotlighting everything that makes the School of Music special.

A timeline of the Thornton School of Music

1880

On Sept. 14, 1880, USC established its very first structure, later known as Widney Hall. The building originally accommodated USC's School of

1884

The USC School of Music was founded, making it the first professional school at the University. Of USC's first 100 graduates, music students made up around half of the population.

1920s

The Department of Musical Organizations, under the leadership of Harold William Roberts, took over the Trojan Marching Band, campus glee clubs and other musical troupes.

Thornton faculty and alumni performed at The Hollywood Bowl, where the Los Angeles Philharmonic also performs.

Arnold Schoenberg, a famous Austrian music theorist and composer, moved to Hollywood and taught a composition class in Mudd Philosophy Hall. He was known for his unorthodox way of teaching musical harmony.

1946

KUSC, USC's flagship radio station, began broadcasting and highlighting Thornton student performances. KUSC eventually became one of the largest broadcasters of classical music in the nation

1947

The Carrie Jacobs Bond scholarship was established. Carrie Jacobs Bond, a Thornton alumna, was the first woman to establish a music publishing firm in the United States.

1948

The Los Angeles Opera was founded, and USC alumna Marilyn Horne made her debut at Shrine Auditorium under the conducting of Carl Ebert.

1953

Marilyn Horne, a famed mezzosoprano, began her career at USC. In Thornton, she studied voice with USC professors William Vennard and Gwendolyn Koldofsky and participated in German soprano Lotte Lehman's master classes. In 1954, she played the voice of Dorothy Dandridge

from the movie Carmen Jones.

String performers William Primrose, Jascha Heifetz and Gregor Piatigorsky taught master classes at USC.

1964

The Dorothy Chandler Pavilion opened. At American composer Steve Reich's birthday tribute, the Los Angeles Philharmonic performed, featuring USC staff member Jascha Heifetz as a soloist.

1974

The Gregor Piatigorsky Chair in Violoncello was established, honoring the famed Russian cellist, who taught at USC from 1962 until his death. Other notable holders of this Chair have included USC professors Lynn Harrell, Ronald Leonard and Eleonore Schoenfeld.

1979

The USC Trojan Marching Band became the largest number of musicians to ever perform on a single in the recording of "Tusk" with Fleetwood Mac.

1984

LA hosted the Olympics, and composer John Williams, a Thornton collaborator and alumnus, won a GRAMMY for "Olympic Fanfare and Theme."

1999

Flora L. Thornton donated \$25 million to the USC School of Music. This gift was the largest contribution to an American music school at the time.

2003

Walt Disney Concert Hall opened, which now hosts the L.A. Master Chorale, led by Thornton alumnus

2004

Famous violinist Midori Goto joined the USC Thornton faculty.

2004

Four USC students won a GRAMMY for their group the Los Angeles Guitar Quartet, which they established in the 1980s.

2007

USC alumnus and Distinguished Professor of Composition Morten Lauridsen was awarded the National Medal of the Arts for his compositions of outstanding choral

2008

USC Thornton established the popular music performance major, a first of its kind at a top-tier university. The major combines courses on musical training, production, technology and entertainment law.

2009

USC Thornton celebrated its 125th anniversary with performances including the USC Thornton Symphony conducted by Michael Tilson Thomas, USC Thornton Choral artists and The Steve Miller Band.

2012

Alice Schoenfeld, a professor of violin, donated \$3 million toward a new symphonic hall for Thornton, now known as the Alice and Eleonore Schoenfeld Symphonic Hall.

2013

The Hollywood Reporter listed USC Thornton School of Music as a top music school in America and a "springboard to the industry."

2013

Glenn Dicterow, who had the longest tenure out of any other former concertmaster, stepped down from the New York Philharmonic to become the Robert Mann Chair in Strings and Chamber Music. Robert Mann, a Juilliard alumni, was a famous violinist and founder of the Juilliard String Quartet.

2013-2014

Gimel "Young Guru" Keaton joined the USC Thornton staff as an artistin-residence. Keaton is a Grammynominated DJ and a music producer who has worked with rapper Jay-Z.

2013

In September 2013, USC Thornton students performed in Bovard Auditorium with Elton John.

2014

Michael Tilson Thomas was named a Judge Widney professor of music at USC. This honor allows Thornton students to work directly with Thomas, one of America's most famous classical musicians and a twotime alumnus of Thornton, himself.

2014

The GRAMMY Museum named the USC Thornton School of Music as its first official university affiliate.

In honor of USC student Victor McElhaney, who was killed in an off-campus shooting, the USC Black Alumni Association established a scholarship to support and encourage success for black music students at Thornton. McElhaney was also honored with a posthumous degree.

On June 13, 2019, the U.S. District Court Central District of California granted preliminary approval for the \$215 million federal class action settlement to compensate patients who received women¹s health services from George Tyndall at the Student Health Center.

As part of the settlement, notice will be provided to potential members of the class in a variety of ways. Beginning July 12, 2019, a court appointed independent settlement administrator will provide public notices on websites, social media, alumni communications, campus publications and physical campus locations like dining and residence halls.

A Settlement has been reached in a class action lawsuit, *In re USC Student Health Center Litigation (No. 2:18-cv-04258-SVW)*, involving Dr. George M. Tyndall, a gynecologist at the University of Southern California ("USC") Student Health Center from August 14, 1989 to June 21, 2016. Current and former USC female students sued alleging that Dr. Tyndall assaulted, abused, sexually harassed, committed medical malpractice related to a Woman's Health Issue, or otherwise acted inappropriately towards female patients while he was a gynecologist at the USC Student Health Center, and that USC and its Board of Trustees failed to respond appropriately to Dr. Tyndall's conduct. Dr. Tyndall and USC each deny the allegations against them but the Parties have agreed to the Settlement to avoid the costs and risks of a lengthy trial and appeals process. This proposed Settlement not only brings meaningful relief to this class of USC graduates and students but stands as a testament both to the strength of these women, coming forward to tell their truth, and to the ability of class actions to create real positive impact for those who have suffered.

Tyndall included an examination by him of her breast or genital areas, or (c) whose treatment included the taking of photographs or videotapes of her unclothed or partially clothed body. "Women's Health Issues" includes, but is not limited to, any issue relating to breast, vaginal, urinary tract, bowel, gynecological, or sexual health, including contraception and fertility. A list of Women's Health Issues is available at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com. Confirmed Settlement Class Members will receive a check for \$2,500 ("Tier 1 Claim Award"), subject to Pro Rata Increase. Settlement Class Members also have the option to submit a Claim Form describing the experience, impact, and/or damages suffered. If a Claim Form is determined eligible under the terms of the Settlement, the Settlement Class Member could receive an additional Claim Award of \$7,500 up to \$20,000 ("Tier 2 Claim Award"), or provide an interview along with a Claim Form and be eligible for a Claim Award of \$7,500 up to \$250,000 ("Tier 3 Claim Award"). Tier 2 and Tier 3 Claim Awards are subject to Pro Rata Adjustment. Additional information including a Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form and Claim Form are available at www.USCTyndallSettlement.com. The deadline to submit a Statement of Settlement Class Membership Form and/or Claim Form is November 8, 2019.

Class Members also have other options. If former patients do not want to be legally bound by the Settlement, they must exclude themselves by **November 7**, **2019**. The Court will hold a Fairness Hearing on **January 6**, **2020** at 1:30 p.m. (Pacific) to decide whether to approve the Settlement.
