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- We are current students or recent graduates at the University of Southern California and have served as active campus leaders in various groups as set out below.
- We are particularly concerned with the issues of sexual assault and abuse, 2. as well as gender-based violence on USC's campus.
- When we learned about Dr. Tyndall's serial abuse of USC students, we 3. were horrified. What was even worse was learning that USC knew about Dr. Tyndall's misconduct, and could have stopped it, but did nothing about it until the story came out and USC felt pressure from the public.
- Even then, we hoped that after news of the USC scandal became publicly 4. known, USC would make meaningful changes on campus to protect its students and make sure that nothing like what Dr. Tyndall did could ever happen again. But the steps USC has taken on its own are halfhearted and inadequate. Protecting USC students and taking a stand against sexual assault and abuse requires real, systemic change—not lip service and half measures.
- Recently, we learned of the proposed class action settlement on behalf of survivors of Dr. Tyndall's abuse. We understand that the proposed settlement includes a financial component to pay Class members, but also equitable relief, to make USC change its ways.
- We have reviewed the Equitable Relief Provisions of the proposed 6. Settlement Agreement, as well as the final report of the Equitable Relief Committee.
- 7. The reforms set out in the Report are important steps toward changing the way things are done at USC, and ensuring that the University invests in real protection for its students that empowers them to feel safe on their own campus.
- While financial compensation for survivors is important, these kinds of 8. reforms are an essential part of making survivors whole. USC allowed Dr. Tyndall to abuse its students, and these reforms are an important signal from USC that it
